Miss Louise Mowborn of Grifton, who has been the guest of Miss Emily Loftin returned to her home this morning.

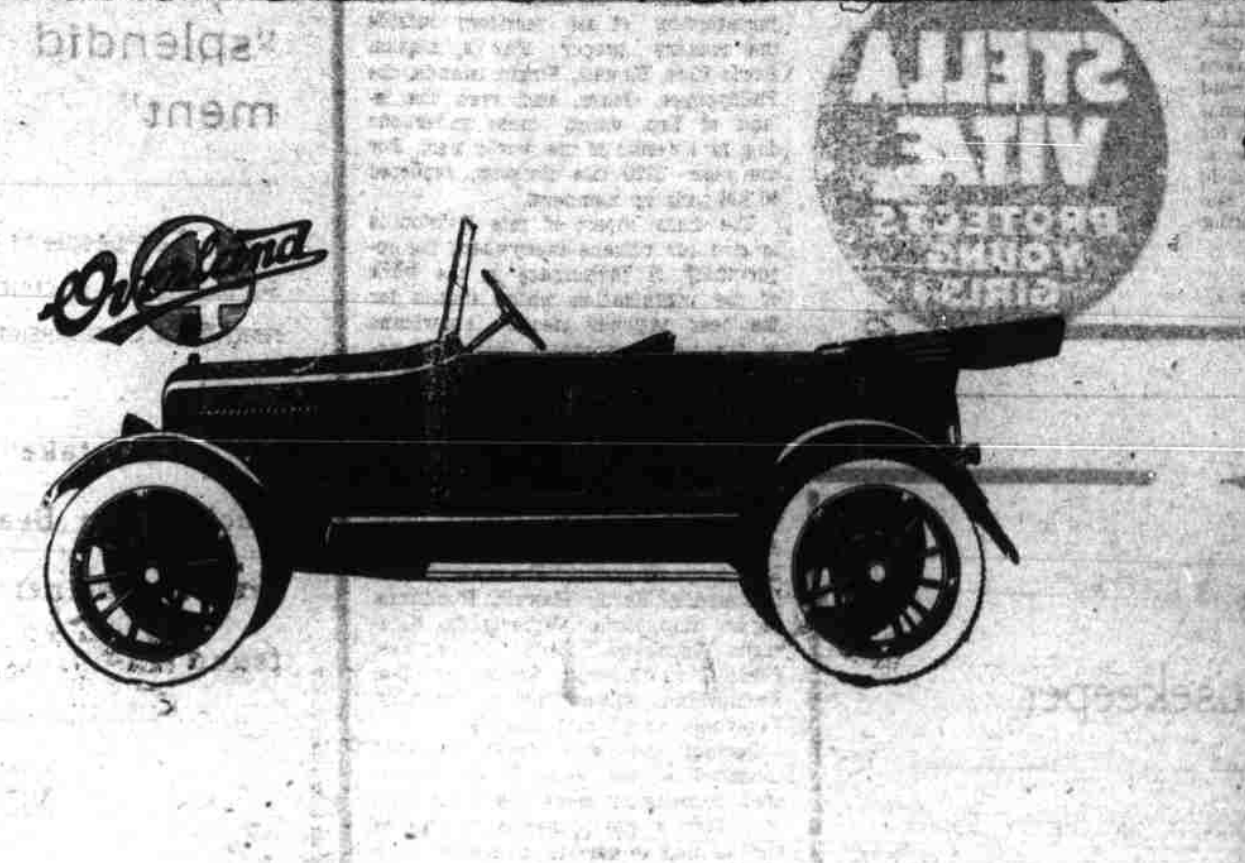
