eral narcotic laws. Four entered pleas of guilty and were fined from \$250 to \$1,000 by Federal Judge Meekins. One was convicted and a disagreement resulted in another case. In addition to paying fines these physicians may lose their license to practice in the State. The Medical Society has the matter under advisement.

Children in by-gone days "ploughed the mud" for miles to reach the school house. Not so these days. The State Department of Education finds that School buses have been carrying 69,391 pupils to school daily the past year. Total daily mileage of busses serving 2,006 schools is reckoned to be 40,765 in ninety five of the 100 counties supplying the children with this convenience. 1,318 busses were operated in 1923-24 covering 26,354 miles daily and transporting 48,251 children. The counties of Alleghany, Cabarrus, Macon, Cherokee, and Perquimans have not yet taken this advanced step in connecting their boys and girls with the school house.

There is to be no postponement of the trial of Jesse Wyatt, former Raleigh detective charged with the murder of Steven S. Holt, Smithfield lawyer, whom Wyatt shot down on the Garner road some four weeks ago under the impression that he was trying to escape with whiskey in his car. Wyatt disclaims any intention of shooting to kill, but simply to stop the car by puncturing tires.

He has employed a formidable array of counsel and will vigorously fight the charge of murder lodged against him by the Wake county Secretary of State Everett has stocked the White Creek Pond, near Rockingham with 9,000 bass from the "Pete Murphy Hatchery" at Marion, McDowell County.

Announcement is made by H. K. Witherspoon publicity engineer of the State Highway Commission, that the hard-surfaced mileage of the State is now 1,846; gravel, shale and topsoil, 3,112; dirt road under State control, 10,044 miles. Total composing the State's highway system 6,002 miles, the major portion of which has been reconstructed since the passage of the first road bond bill by the General Assembly of 1921. Mr. Witherspoon also announces the discontinuance of the discontinuance of the State Highway Bulletin of which he has been the guiding spirit the past several years.

Governor McLean has appointed Hon. Robert N. Page as representative of the public on the board of directors of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Co-operative marketing association.

Governor McLean and Treasurer Lacy made a trip to New York during the week to close the loans arranged on a previous visit to the Metropolis with the First National Bank of that city. \$10,000,000 were borrowed on short term notes at 3 1/2 per cent and \$5,000,000 on long term notes at 4 1/2 per cent. Four million more will be borrowed as needed later in the year. The Governor's little son, Angus W., Junior accompanied his father to "take in the sights" for the first time.

Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, State Commissioner of Public Welfare, advocates the abolition of all county chain gangs and State care of prisoners whom, she thinks should be classified according to their mental and physical ability and placing them in the lines of work they are best fitted to perform.

The State Board of Charities and Public Welfare announces the selection of Miss Mamie Frances Camp, superintendent of the local board of Harnet county to the directorship of county organization work with the State Board. Miss Camp will first take a course in social work at the New York School of Social Science beginning her State work later in the year.

The Coal Glen Mine Disaster Relief Fund has reached expectations and gone "over the top." Responding to the proclamation of Governor McLean the people of the State have contributed \$35,404.38, or more than \$400 in excess of the amount said to be needed. The Red Cross is distributing this fund on the basis of the actual needs of the beneficiaries.

Raleigh traffic officers have been busy rounding up offenders the past week, hundreds having paid fines for infractions of one kind and another. The principal offences recorded were operating with one light, parking double, lack of rear lights, bright head lights and driving without dimmers. Minimum fine, two dollars.

Stacey W. Wade, insurance commissioner, states that the fire loss in the State during the month of May exceeds the "sizable" sum of \$361,400 and that the number of fires reported is 156. Value of property at risk \$1,431,070, on which there was insurance aggregating \$806,920. The

larger blazes occurred at Morganton, Burlington, Shelby, Smithfield, Ayden, Hamlet and Wadesboro. After a recent conference with the executive committee of the Cullowhee Normal and Industrial School Governor McLean announced that matters in dispute appeared to be practically settled. An entirely new board is in charge at Cullowhee by the appointment of the Governor.
