MASONIC LOANS FOR N. C. SCHOOLS

Funds Amounting To \$35,000 Are Available To College Students.

These Loan Funds are distributed among all the schools of the state with College Courses and are available to students without respect to any Masonic affiliation or relations.
Both the Scottish and York Rite Bodies are co-operating in supporting these funds. The Masonic Loan Fund began in 1922 with \$5,000.00 contributed by the Grand Lodge of Masons and the York Rite Bodies. In 1924 the Scottish Rite Bodies joined in the movement and for the last three years the fund has been increased at the rate of \$10,000.00 a year. The present basis is \$3,000.00 from the Grand Lodge, \$4,000.00 from the York Rite Bodies, and \$3,000.00 from the Scottish Rite Bodies. The fund will ultimately be increased to a sum equal to \$20.00 for each teacher-training student, \$10.00 for each woman student, and \$5.00 for each man student in every institution in the state doing college work.

Davis, N. C.
