TUBERCULOSIS PATIENTS NOT NECESSARILY DANGEROUS

Sonatorium, November 4—By shunning the careful "T. B." the public makes it impossible or very difficult for a careful, conscientious tuberculous person to take the precautions his doctors have taught him are necessary if he is going to keep from giving his disease to others.

Shielding the mouth with gauze, a paper napkin or a handkerchief that can be burned and depositing the sputum coughed up in a pasteboard cup to be burned are the most important precautions a "T. B." should take to keep from spreading his disease to others.

Every cough must be covered, because colds, la grippe, and influenza are spread in much the same way as tuberculosis. When the public sees a man or a woman in a public place cough carefully into a gauze that is held over his mouth and then spit into a pasteboard cup the public promptly shuns that person as if they had some deadly plague. Don't. The person has observed every precaution that is necessary to keep the public from becoming infected with his disease. But shun the man or the woman who coughs and spits promiscuously on the world in general, regardless of whether or not he has tuberculosis. If he doesn't have tuberculosis he has something or he would not cough, and may be caught just as tuberculosis is caught.

If the public would reward the man who uses the proper precautions with a smile and not a frown for his trouble, and give the man who does not a frown, and every person who coughs would use these precautions, all diseases that cause a cough, both tuberculosis and diseases that are spread by careless coughing would soon be on the run.
