## COMMERCIALIZING THE SWEET POTATO

Up until recent years the sweet potato has been almost exclusively a southern dish. With the migration of southerners to northern and eastern cities, there began to grow up a demand for this vegetable in northern markets and the Yankees are now acquiring a taste for the sweet potato, mostly of the "dry" varieties, such as are being extensively grown in New Jersey and other northern states; while the dyed-in-the-wool southerner likes his yam. If our growers want to sell their potatoes in these markets, they should grow the kind that the markets demand; while, for the local trade, they can continue to raise their Porto Ricans, their Nancy Halls, or what ever variety may please their fancy. The first step, however, in catering to out-of-state markets is to invest in potato curing houses so that the potatoes can be shipped over a longer period and as the markets call for them, thus obtaining a better price than if the product is dumped early in the season. Equally important is shipping-point inspection and stand-

growers will not have to pay carrying charges on a lot of low-grade stuff, which would tend to lower the price on the whole shipment.—(Market News.)
