**STATE CAPITAL QUIET EXCEPT
 SOME POLITICAL DISCUSSION**

the leadership of Walter H. Neal against
 all theories of Evolution probably
 will lead into a great fight in
 the next legislature, when an evolu-
 tion bill is expected to be introduced.
 Dr. R. T. Vann, prominent Bap-
 tist minister and educator, who fell
 on the street here several days ago
 and broke his left arm, already am-
 putated above the elbow, is out a-
 gain after an extended stay at a local
 hospital, Doctor Vann is associate
 secretary of the Baptist State
 Board of Education. He was formerly
 President of the Meredith Col-
 lege.

United States Senator Lee S.
 Overman is taking no chances on
 "Our Bob." Campaign headquar-
 ters have been established on the sec-
 ond floor of the Yarbrough House
 with former Solicitor Walter D. Siler
 in charge and Hugh Dortch of
 Goldsboro assistant manager. Man-
 ager Siler says he is not apprehen-
 sive of the outcome and the purpose
 of the campaign is simply to bring
 out the vote.
 A portrait of the last Associate
 Justice Platt D. Walker was presented
 to the Supreme Court by Attorney
 E. T. Cansler, of Charlotte, during
 the week before a large assem-
 blage of relatives and friends of the
 deceased jurist in the court room
 here. The acceptance was by Chief
 Justice W. P. Stacey.
 Governor McLean observes that
 there is growing interest in business
 government, the reason for this ten-
 dency being the responsibility in a
 financial way which falls upon busi-
 ness men in the maintenance of
 state and county governments. His
 Excellency also finds that the women
 are becoming more interested in fiscal
 matters and feels hopeful of fu-
 ture developments in governmental
 agencies.
 The population of the capital city
 of the State has recently been boost-
 ed to the extent of thirty-five per-
 sons connected with the Accidental
 Life Insurance Company which has
 established headquarters in the new

professional building here. The
 staff of the Accidental and their fam-
 ilies arrived here during the week
 from Albuquerque, New Mexico, with
 the expectation of making Raleigh,
 North Carolina, their future home.
 Insurance Commission Wade com-
 mends the Occidental Insurance Com-
 pany most highly.
 Governor McLean decided lately to
 request the North Carolina Child
 Welfare Commission to make the sur-
 vey of women in industry which has
 been the subject of much vehement
 during recent months. This Com-
 mission is composed of the State
 Commissioner of Public Welfare,
 chairman, the State Superintendent
 of Public Instruction and the Sec-
 retary of the State Board of Health.
 The survey was requested by leading
 women and organizations and by the
 State Federation of Labor. Strenuous
 objections has been made by manu-
 facturers generally over the State.
 The survey will be started pretty
 soon.

Superintendent A. T. Allen, of the
 State Department of Education, an-
 nounces the addition of Dr. M. C. S.
 Noble, Jr., to his official staff as ed-
 ucational director of the newly cre-
 ated bureau of information and statis-
 tics. Mr. L. L. Williams, of the
 State University, also goes with the
 Department of the capacity of loan
 clerk of June 1st, succeeding L. H.
 Jobe, now head of the bureau of pub-
 lications. Mr. Williams is a native
 of Yadkin county.

The second payment of the 1925
 cotton crop (one million dollars in
 amount) has gone out to members
 of the North Carolina Cotton Growers
 Association from its general office
 here. The total receipts for the
 1925 crop aggregated 160,661 bales,
 or 44,900 more than the previous
 year.
 It is announced from the Federal
 Department of Agriculture that
 North Carolina has double the num-
 ber of counties free from tubercular
 cattle than any other state in the
 Union, the number in this State ag-
 gregating fifty-seven per cent. In
 this work the State Federal govern-
 ments cooperate, the local representa-
 tive being Dr. William Moore, veter-
 inarian of the State Department of
 Agriculture and a very capable man.

The Executive Committee of the
 State Board of Health held a business
 meeting here during the week; a con-
 tract has been awarded for the con-
 struction of a new hospital for the
 State School for the Blind authorized
 by the last Legislature; hearing of
 the application of the Western Union
 Telegraph Company for an increase
 in rates has again been postponed;
 eighty-seven applicants for trained
 nurse licenses received the examina-
 tion here last week; the Secretary of
 State issued a charter to the North
 Carolinians Incorporated, Greens-
 boro.

The United States paid \$295 an
 acre for the Virgin Islands, \$35.80
 an acre for the Canal Zone, 27 cents
 for the Philippines, and 2 cents for
 2 cents for Alaska.

Divorces in Russia may now be
 obtained in twelve minutes, due to
 the substitution of an American
 card index system for the cumbersome
 registry books formerly in use.
