

Morehead City Revival Meetings Are Now Arousing Much Interest

Morehead City, April 13th.—
The revival meetings which began here at First Baptist church Sunday April 3rd, are now in full swing. These meetings are being conducted by Dr. Oscar Haywood of Mount Gilead, N. C. evangelist and Mr. W. Furman Betts, of Raleigh, N. C. singer. Not only is Dr. Haywood a noted platform speaker, but he is also one of the foremost Gospel preachers of today. Several of them have done work on the Pacific coast and in other parts of the country. For several weeks they have been working up Bogue Sound and recently at Shackleford Banks, Fort Macon and Beaufort harbor. They have been making tide observations, de-

termining the mean sea level and doing topographical work. They are also making a map of the south side of Bogue Sound. The work in Beaufort Harbor was finished Wednesday.
