**Distress In State
Topic Of Discussion**

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—Reported increases of distress of persons in a number of sections in North Carolina be-

cause of floods, crop failures and unemployment were discussed at a conference today between Governor Gardner and representatives of state welfare and charitable agencies.

It was decided that the governor appoint a person in each county to head a county relief committee to be composed of the welfare officer, president of the women's club, the county health officer and heads of welfare and charitable organizations.

The conference reported that the purposes of these organizations would be to co-ordinate the relief work of existing organizations and provide such material assistance in individual cases as may be found necessary.

Those attending the conference included Dr. Charles O'H. Laughinghouse, state health officer; Mrs. Thomas O'Berry, representing the state federation of women's clubs; Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon, state home demonstration agent and Mrs. Raymond Binford, of Guilford College, head of the State Parent-Teacher congress.

**Will Present Facts
About Food Crops**

(By F. H. Jeter)
Raleigh, Dec. 30.—How nearly the different counties of North Carolina are growing their own supplies of food and feed and whether the main crops are being produced at a profit or loss are some of the interesting facts that will be presented to the farm people of North Carolina during the next four months.

The Board of Trustees of State College has authorized President E. C. Brooks to proceed with the expenditure of sufficient funds to see that this information is carried to the leading farmers and to the local press. For the past several months a careful study has been made of the food production problem in this State. A careful record of both production, consumption and profits has been made under the direction of C. A. Sheffield, assistant director of extension. It is reported that some of the facts will be of great interest in that they do not follow the results given wide publicity by economists at other institutions.

For instance, says Dean I. O. Schaub, Mr. Sheffield's figures show that the farmers of the State on the average are nearly feeding themselves. It is the city folks who are buying food from outside, therefore the question now is how to grow and prepare this food for sale to urban population. The figures show further that North Carolina's bill for imported food is nearer one hundred and a half million dollars than it is two hundred and a half million. The new figure also includes a bill for some twenty million dollars worth of milk that we should drink but in reality do not.

The extension service plans therefore during the next four months to show by actual and carefully secured data the condition in each county so that the Boards of Agriculture, the county agent and the county officials may take the necessary steps to help balance the local agriculture.

Full plans for presenting this information will be made at the annual extension conference to be held at the College during the week of January 6.

**Duke Endowment Aids
Carolina Hospitals**

Charlotte, Jan. 2.—Hospitals in the two Carolinas received \$1,098,262.78 from the Duke endowment in 1928 according to the annual report of Dr. W. S. Rankin, director of the hospital and orphan section, which was made public today.

During the year, the endowment contributed to the hospitals assisted 14.7 per cent of the total cost of caring for their in-patients, or a sum of \$518,999, it was stated.

In its plan of contributing \$1 each day for the number of free days recorded by hospitals of the two states, the endowment gave a total of \$433,997 to hospitals of the two Carolinas in 1928, in this phase of its work. Figures in this case were based upon the number of free days in 1927.

For new buildings and equipment, the sum of \$55,266.78 was paid by the endowment organization.

Three new hospitals, which had been built with the assistance of the

endowment, were opened in 1928. These were the Haywood county hospital at Waynesville to which the endowment gave \$10,000; the Marion

General hospital at Marion which received \$25,000 and the Garrett Memorial at Crossnore to which the endowment gave \$8,250.

The Lincoln hospital in Durham was given \$2,416.78 for equipment and \$4,600 went to the North Carolina Baptist hospital in Winston-Salem for a nurses' home. The endowment gave the Marlboro County General hospital at Bennettsville, S. C., \$15,000 to be applied on a new plant.

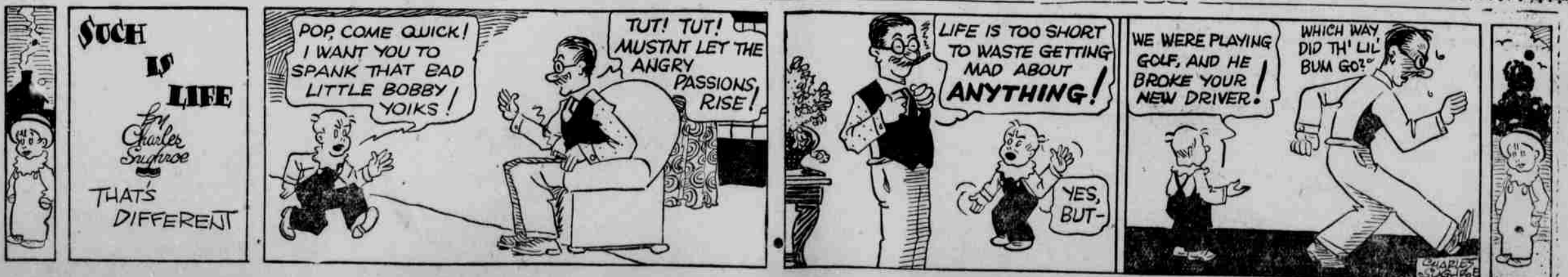
