Drunkeness Brings Six BIG GAME REFUGE WILL BE CREATED IN THIS COUNTY

Give Large Tract On Core Banks

WILL BE STATE PARK

(Raleigh News & Observer) North Carolina will acquire permanently its first migratory wild game refuge and a suitable area for the development of a great State park under terms of an offer made Alison Fulford, colored, was given by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lassiter, of ment made yesterday by Gov. O. Max Gardner.

The area which Mr. and Mrs. Lassiter have offered to deed to the State after a probationary period of five years of administration, Governor Gardner said, is located in Carteret County along that narrow strip of land known as "the banks" lying between the Atlantic Ocean and Pam lico Sound, and contains a number of small islands adjoining.

In all, the property extends for a dollars and cost for being drunk and distance of more than eight miles along "the banks," beginning at a point a few miles below Portsmouth.
