NATIONAL AFFAIRS

It is the opinion among students of political affairs in Washington, generally expressed, that the nomination of Ruth McCormick by the Republicans of Illinois to succeed Senator Dineen, is a clean-cut expression of the decision of the people of Illinois

on the World Court issue. Mrs. McCormick made the Root formula for adherence to the World Court the paramount issue of the campaign. Senator Dineen had voted for the World Court resolution when the matter was placed before the Senate in 1926 by President Coolidge. He defended this vote on the stump in the recent Illinois primary campaign and was defeated by a plurality of more than 200,000 votes.

Senator Dineen's record as a senator has been a good one. There was no special criticism as to his ability to perform the duties of the dignified office of United States senator in an efficient way. The principal criticism directed against him in the primary campaign, by his opponents, was his support of the World Court. The prohibition issue did not enter into the contest because both Mrs. McCormick and Senator Dineen had the approval of the dry

organizations.

Many political students at Washington have made the further point since the Illinois primary that political misfortune seems to follow a great many of the senators who have supported the World Court in the past. In the number are the names of the late Senator McKinley, of Illinois, and Senator Lenrott, of Wisconsin, who led the World Court forces when the resolution was passed by the Senate with reservations. Opponents of the World Court claim that defeat of Senator Dineen indicates that despite the increasing interest which the people have shown in our international affairs, there has been no increasing support for the idea that we ought to be more closely associated with the nations of Europe in a political way. The tradition of American aloofness dates back to George Washington's administration, and it seems to be almost impossible to break.

If Mrs. McCormick is successful in the fall she will be the first woman elected to the United States Senate. In 1922 the Governor of Georgia appointed Mrs. Rebecca Felton to fill an unexpired term of thirty-six days in the Senate. She actually served one day in the Senate. Twelve women have been members of the national House of Representatives.

Other interesting primaries are to come. Among those which will soon occupy the spotlight are the contests in North Carolina and Alabama, where Senator Simmons and Senator Hefflin have strong opposition. The way the bitter fights have been developing in these two states is not very comforting to the Democratic national committee which had hoped that the factional lines of 1928 were about obliterated. Only time can tell whether or not this hope is to be realized. Political conditions have not been more chaotic in a long time than they are today. There is a

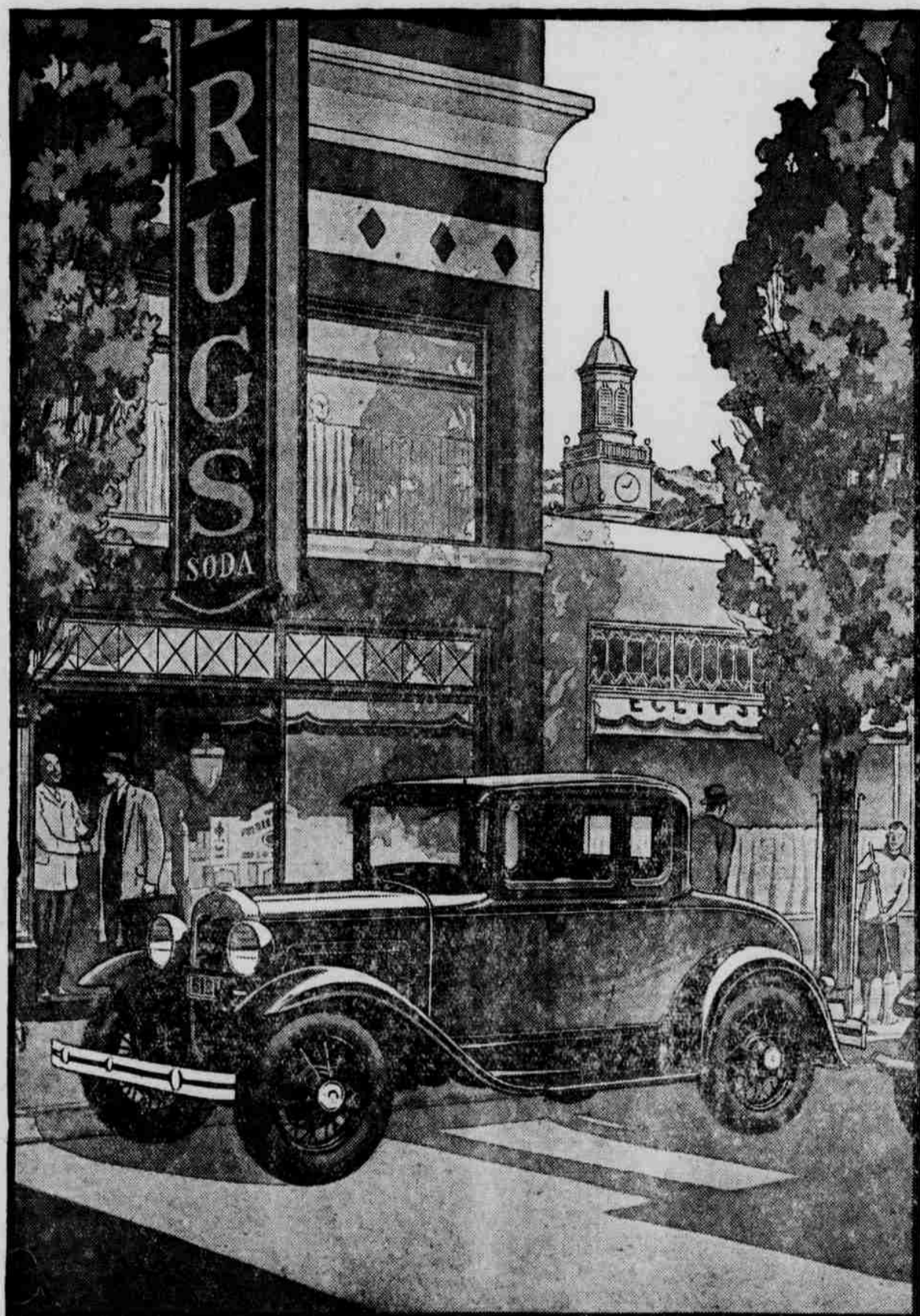
line of cleavage between the regular Republicans and Progressive Republicans, and the Democrats are still divided, too, on the prohibition question. The coming congressional campaign promises to be more than usually interesting.
