NEW VEHICLE LAW Effective July 1st, 1931

The General Assembly of North Carolina has enacted a law, that compels the Commissioner of Revenue, to revoke the license and registration of a person, when a judgment in excess of \$100, has been rendered against such person, arising out of the use of a motor vehicle, where such judgment remains unpaid after 30 days unless such person shall furnish proof of his ability to pay in damages for future accidents.

The object of this law is to protect the public from irresponsible drivers of motor vehicles who are indifferent and negligent of the lives and property of others.
