Mysterious Grave

The chamber of commerce of Gary. Ind., says that it believes the grave which lies near Gary in the middle of the steel plants is that of one Andreas Zirnglbil, which lies within the city limits of Chicago on the main highway between Gary and that city. Mr. Zirngibil is said to have owned large tracts of land on the southern shores of Lake Michigan which was considered in his time as waste land." When he died he willed that his remains be buried in this land and that it never be disturbed. Although the will is said to have been broken, the grave still remains in its original place almost entirely surrounded by industry. Homes Both Distinctive

About 1100 A. D., the Crusaders entered Byzantium and the Holy land and carried many ideas back to the countries of central Europe. The Persians and Arabians likewise carried the Byzantine influences to their respective countries. From this the Arabs developed a type of landscape architecture very different from previous styles. Their ideas were carried by them to the countries of northern Africa and by the Moors to Spain, where many famous gardens were made. These all had a touch of oriental design.

The American Colonists found no gardens in this country when they landed. They brought with them ideas from England which were influenced by the necessity of growing their own fruits and vegetables. Their desire for ornamental plantings was inherited from their English ancestors and this desire has now grown to the extent that the United States is outstanding in its development of small home gardens. The growth of these gardens has kept pace with the increase in population, and the construction of homes and the style, while influenced by many others in past centuries, has become truly and distinctlvely American.
