DISTRICT GROUP TEACHERS MEETING HELD AT NEWPORT

NEWPORT, Jan. 22.—The dis-
trict group of teachers, composing of
White Oak, Camp Glenn, and New-
port faculties, met at Newport on
Monday afternoon, January 22 at
four o'clock to discuss "The Proper
Health Standards" to set forth in
our schools as teachers. The fol-
lowing topics were ably discussed:
"What signs of health, easily detect-
ed by the lay person, are usually to
be found in the child," by R. L.
Fruit. "What conditions promote nor-
mal physical growth for children,"
and "What handicaps may exist in
school children" by Rosalie Murdock.
"What is to be done to prevent phys-
ical defects and to remedy existing
ones," by Mary Catherine Holland.
"How can proper mental growth and
training suited to his capacities be
secured for each child," by Gertrude
Styron. "How can social and moral
developments be promoted so that
each child may learn to lead a use-
ful and happy life," by Lucy Flem-
ing. "What evidence have we that
health education should be a part of
the public school curriculum," by
Rochelle Willis.
Since the Newport faculty con-
ducted the program, they decided to
entertain the visiting teachers by
serving a hot drink with wafers.
