Visitors to Beaufort interested in strange specimens of sea life should go to the marine museum at the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries on Piver's Island. Dr. Prytherch, the director, says that the two headed terrapin which still lives happily in a special tank will be moved down stairs into the museum so that visitors may get a view of it without going to the forbidden area of the laboratory where visiting and local scientists are carrying on their research. Last week a crabber brought to the laboratory a triple-clawed blue-crab which will be on display to any visitor interested in a marine freak of this kind.
