C. I. rifled, 6 inch, .4 bore and six 32-pdr. Carronades."

"Under date of September 29, 1903 instructions were issued by this office to ship all guns, carriages, projectiles, implements, etc., on hand at Fort Macon to Watertown Arsenal, Watertown, Mass. The guns were later declared obsolete and disposed of through gift and sale under specified Acts of Congress, therefore, it would be impossible to locate and replace the specific guns which were formerly on hand at Fort Macon.

"Under date of December 14, 1903 the District Engineer Officer at Wilmington, North Carolina was instructed to take over the old Fort and such property as remained there.
