its of the organization automatically assures them of the maximum profit to be derived from their catches.

That fishermen generally are beginning to think more seriously of

the cooperative movement was evidenced this week in a number of requests from fishing communities in which Chapters have not been formed asking representatives of the organization to aid in setting up Chapters in those communities. Every effort is being made to extend the organization into these communities as rapidly as possible. From a nucleus of 500 North Carolina fishermen, representing the present membership of the organization, the organization contemplates a gradual expansion paralleling sales and consumption development.

Sales development has been under way in western North Carolina during the past thirty days with special attention being devoted to fresh meat markets and groceries in which seafoods have not been featured. Response has not been phenomenal but a number of new seafood dealers have been developed all of which will contribute materially to the annual production of seafoods for North Carolina fishermen.

While not ready to enter into full production The Fisheries organization is working day and night to complete the storage facilities and the cannery in order to be of every service possible to its membership.
