On May 21, Dr. Prytherch, director of the U. S. Fisheries laboratory on Piver's Island was elected president of the National Shellfish Association.

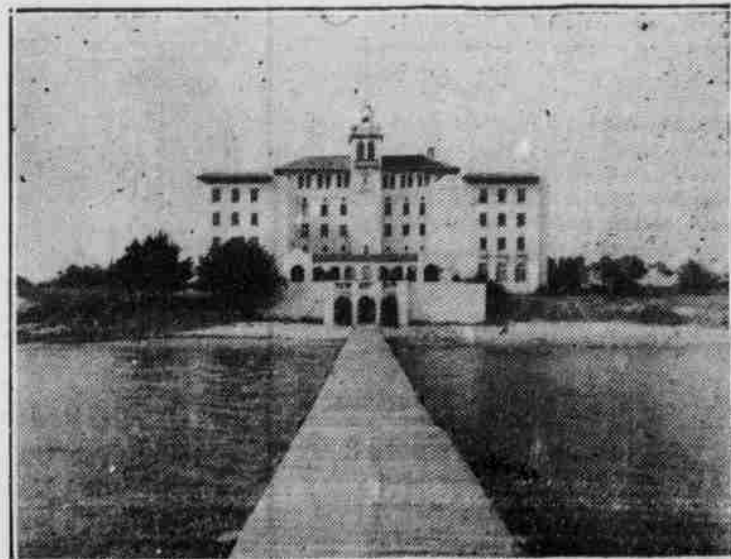
## EDITOR

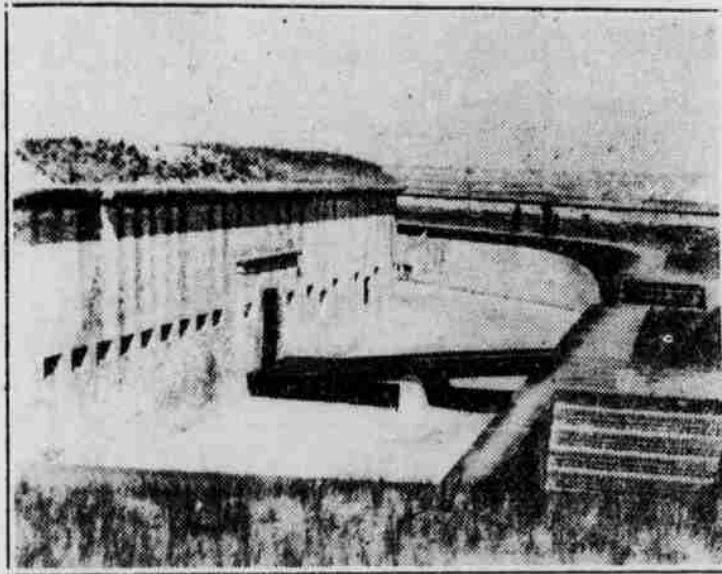
## VILLA HOTEL BECOMES EDGEWATER CLUB

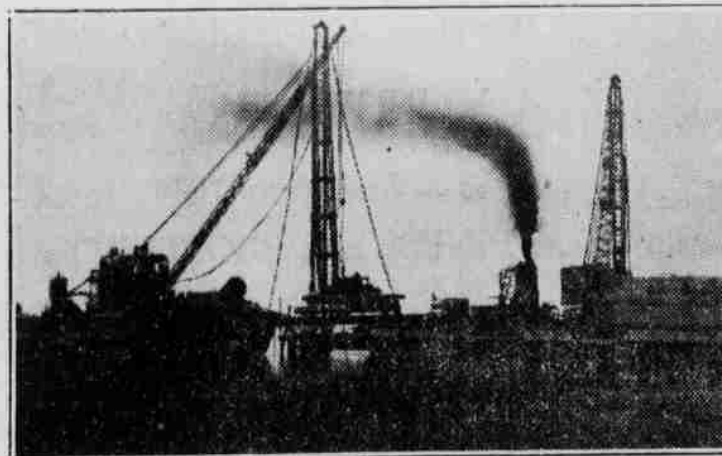


**Thousands Have Passed This Route**

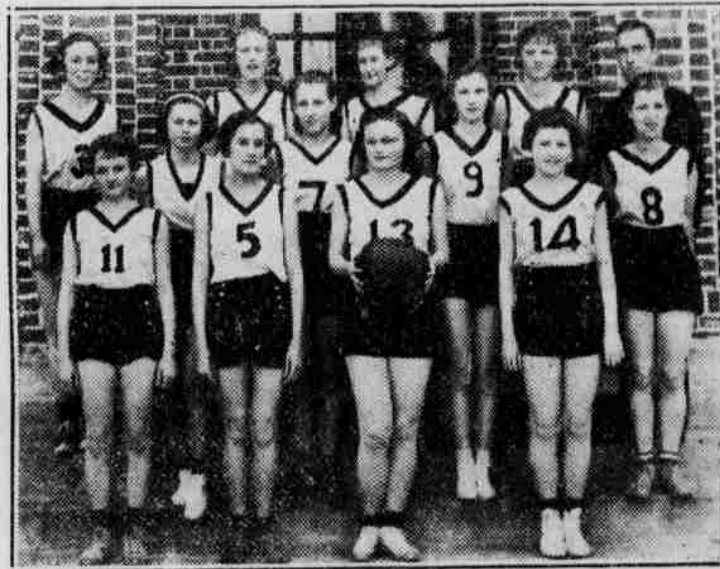


**The Port Terminal Became A Reality In 1935**

**On Beaufort Harbor**

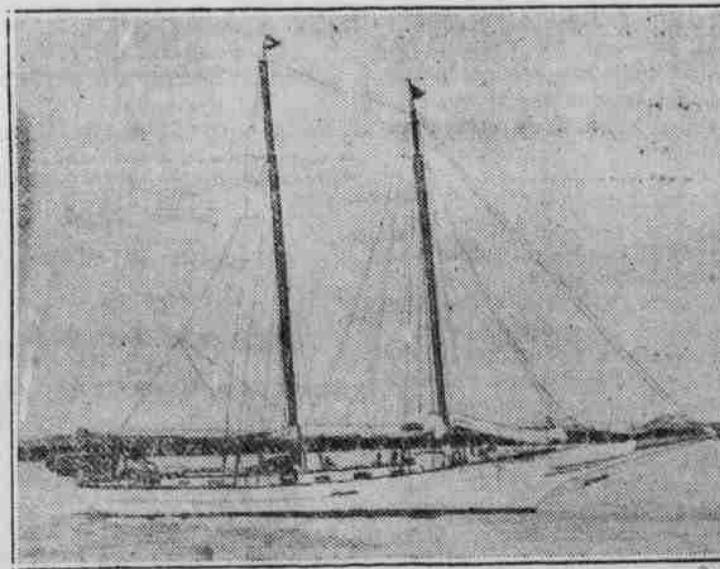
