

Credit Association Will Now Take Loans For Another Season

New officers in the Guion Building on Broad street will serve its three counties, Craven, Carteret and Pamlico says R. F. Allen, Secretary-Treasurer.

Applications are now being taken for production loans for another season. Also other type of loans are being made at this time.

The Association feels that they are now in better position to serve the farmer than they have been heretofore, due to having all applications made in the central office. It will eliminate a good deal of red tape and expediate the procedure in securing the money for the purpose for which owed.

The out-laying counties will have strict attention towards its borrowers. So they may make only one trip to the office unless it is absolutely necessary. The chief aim is to serve the public more promptly and efficiently, thereby making the expenses of the loan as inexpensive as possible.

Truck growers are urged to apply early. And it is asked that they anticipate their needs and prepare a statement of what they expect to do another year before coming to the office.

The Association made loans in Carteret, Pamlico and Craven counties last year, totaling a little over \$86,000.00 to its farmer borrowers. They have repaid approximately 99 percent and the remaining balance not

Capt. John Morton who has been manager of the farm for Dr. Maxwell will be succeeded by Roy Eubanks, whom you probably know as a photographer, but a young man born and reared on a farm in Carteret county. Mr. Kinsey instructed his new manager to start work immediately towards getting the land cultivated and as a result plowing will begin within a week or 10 days.
Mr. Kinsey goes in for tomato farming on a large scale. He will not only market the yield of his own farm, but will probably buy from other Carteret farmers. That in itself should be an inducement to many farmers who have experienced difficulties in tomato marketing previously.
In the meantime, F. R. Seeley, who established the Chamber of Commerce Cannery stated this week that he believed about 600 acres in Carteret would be devoted to tomato growing during the coming season. This industry promises to be one of the biggest in the county during 1936. Geo. Huntley and Mr. Seeley will probably devote a number of acres to tomatoes that will be used exclusively by the cannery.
The Carteret tomato industry promises to be of much importance during 1936 and many persons will be given employment as a result. Many of the farms are already considering the planting of seeds at an early date for plants. The vastness and importance of truck farming north and east of Beaufort has grown by leaps and bounds since the Newport River was trestled to bring the railroad to East Carteret county.
