The GOPs of Carteret have been quite busy lately getting their ducks in a row, if one can call a candidate a duck, and according ot the belief of local politicians who do not vote the Democratic ticket, a strong ticket has been lined up. Especially is that true with the possible candidates for board of county commissioners. As for the sheriff's office, the party leaders are quite likely to let them fight it out among themselves, considering the fact that so many have been reported to be seeking office.

Gilliam Grissom was for years the collector of internal revenue for North Carolina with headquarters in Ralegih. He is a speaker of note and it is quite likely a full house will hear his address. Incidentally he is the first candidate for governor that has set foot in Carteret this gubernatorial season-anyway the first to make a speech.

As fast as the candidates are named they will have to rush down stairs to Col. Langdale's office in the annex to file. No candidate will be permitted to file after 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon, according to the election
