However the school officials of the Beaufort High School wish to state that beginning the 1st of September of this year that an accurate record is being maintained of all school funds both for athletics and for the general fund. Although Mr. Carlton, the principal, in the eyes of the public is responsible for all funds, it may be stated in his behalf that no funds of any nature pass into his hands, but into the treasurer of the school board, Mr. Blythe Noe. Anyone wishing to see the financial condition of the school will gladly be shown the records if he will call at Mr. Carlton's office. When sufficient time has elapsed a public statement in the newspaper will be had.

BEAUFORT

The Beaufort coach will have plenty of reserves when the basketball season gets under way. There will be three teams if not four this year. This applies to the boys team. There will be one girls team with an ample supply of substitutes. These reserves will be the team of next year. The athletic program of the school has been extended so that it embraces all students from and including the sixth grade thru the High School. Activities will include not only outside competitive games but also intermural. A program county wide in scope is being planned which will call for competition in football, touch football, basketball, soft ball, tennis and baseball.

Allen's office in which to discuss the athletic program of the county for the remainder of the school year and to draw up a basketball schedule. The report of this meeting will be published in next week's column along with the basketball schedule. It is of interest to note that the W. P. ALMA CLAY MORGAN

The beloved wife of our pastor, Mrs. Alma Clay Morgan, went to her reward from the Rocky Mount Sanitarium in the early morning of September 8, 1936, the result of a tragic collision on the Durham-Wake Forest Highway July 29.

Alma Clay Morgan was born in Halifax county, N. C., April 9, 1878. After studying three years in Meredith College, she taught nine years at Central, Bailey and Stantonburg, and was then home demonstration agent for four years in Jones county. She was married to Rev. J. M. Morgan in the First Baptist church of Rocky Mount, N. C., in 1902. She honored every position of trust she held by a rare measure of devotion and faithfulness. Every task she undertook she did efficiently and with enthusiasm. Her winsome, gentle personality won its way into the hearts of all who knew her, and this with her deep religious earnestness and consecration, fitted her eminently for the position of pastor's wife, in which she endeared herself to the Beaufort church and community to a rare degree. Her life was a living sacrifice for others and the Saviour she loved. As daughter and sister in her parental home, as pastor's wife and Christian worker, and as neighbor and friend, she gave herself utterly, and the world is richer because she lived.
