Many eyebrows will be lifted and it is going to be a mighty difficult job to explain satisfactorily to a county of fishermen, why the Commissioners should appropriate \$40 a month during these hard times to teach farming in a county that hasn't in production 500 acres of farm land. In fact, the Farm Demonstration Agent is going to have a harder job to sell himself to the county than did the late Miss Alice Carter when she appeared in Dare as the first Home Demonstration Agent the County ever had.

The fishermen wonder why not a "Fish Agent," and some may wonder why they should be bothered with somebody in who would come to teach more fish and to get better prices, and to provide better protection.

There is something that a farm Agent can do much for the fishermen. If he is able enough, and knows more than those he would teach, his task will be to induce the fishermen to plant and raise more vegetables.

they will not have to send so much people can be brought to the point of raising more food, and saving money, then the great loss in fishing revenue will be considerably offset, and the Farm Agent will be worth his salt. Otherwise, it looks like a difficult road ahead.—Dare County Times

How Wild Fowl Exterminate Selves

Modern science has been making some rapid strides in recent years in its relentless warfare on diseases that afflict and destroy wild fowl. The U. S. Biological Survey, in making an intense study of wild life diseases, recently found that ducks frequently suffer from a disease the direct cause of which is contaminated food. The disease has wiped out many thousands of ducks, especially in the State of Utah where about 19,000 dead ducks were found to a mile of shoreline.

Wild ducks and geese have a habit of thoroughly working over attractive food areas. They are known to go over every square yard often digging deep down into the mud in their intense eagerness to get up every last morsel of food. In such a way duck feeding grounds often become contaminated, the Biological Survey found.—Dare County Times
