SS PAYMENTS ARE ON THE INCREASE

Size of Federal Old Age Insurance Payments Now Being Made By Social Security Steadily Increasing

WILMINGTON, N. C., Oct. 29—The steadily increasing size of Federal lump sum payments the Social Security Board is making now to eligible individual claimants under the old age insurance provisions of the Social Security Act has brought the average lump sum payment in Region IV up to \$17.94 as of September 30, George W. Jeffrey, Manager of the Wilmington Social Security Board Field Office, which serves this area, announced today.

A total of 1,287 claims for lump sums had been certified by the Social Security Board for payment in Region IV up to the close of business on September 30, Mr. Jeffrey said. Region IV embraces North Carolina, The District of Columbia, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia.

Of the total for the Region, 299 were certified for payment to claimants in North Carolina. The average amount of the lump sum paid them was \$16.10. There have been six claims filed through the Wilmington Field Office, which is located 101 Customhouse Building.

Figures for the rest of Region IV follow: District of Columbia, 120 claims certified, average payment \$22.52; Maryland, 404 claims certified, average payment, \$19.04; Virginia, 226 claims certified, average payment, \$15.91; West Virginia, 238 claims certified, average payment \$18.03.

Mr. Jeffrey said: "The increasing number of claims filed with the Social Security Board for Federal lump sum payments under the old age insurance provisions of the law is attributable, in a large measure, to a growing appreciation of the fact that the Board is prepared to certify Federal lump sum payments to thousands of workers who have become eligible since last December 31, or to the estates and relatives of deceased eligible workers. The old age insurance part of the social security program is the only phase which is entirely administered by the Federal government. No one should confuse old age insurance with other parts of the program, such as old age assistance, which are State-Federal programs administered

Weather Statistics During Past Month in Beaufort Vicinity

Twenty three days of October's weather was absolutely clear in Beaufort and the remainder cloudy from sunrise to sunset, according to the monthly statistics furnished by the Co-operating Observer's Meteorological Record of the U. S. Fisheries Laboratory on Piver's Island. No frost was recorded in the vicinity of Beaufort. The minimum temperature during the month was 41 degrees, the maximum was 89. Generally speaking the weather in Beaufort during October was typical of Indian summer and very pleasant.

If the amount of the claim is \$100 or less it is not even necessary for a claimant to get a notary public to put his seal on the claims papers. It is not necessary for anyone to hire an agent to file a claim for him. Naturally the Board has to have some proof that the person filing a claim is entitled to the amount claimed, but the procedure has been made as simple and easy as possible and Field Offices of the Social Security Board will give full information and assistance to any person who believes he has a sum due and wishes to file a claim."
