'CHEWEL EMBROIDERY' GOT NAME FROM EGYPTIAN ART.

Do you know how old the art of needlework is? It may date back to the early ages when smart gowns were fashioned of foliage, but it is really a craft that was quite well established long before the Christian era. It is said that the oldest known specimens of embroidery were worked in colored wool on a closely woven ground and are of Egyptian craftsmanship. This is the type of needlework that is now termed "chevel embroidery," a word having an old name for wool and "chevel" being a word in the Phoenician language.

This style of embroidery is said to have been practiced in Egypt from very early times. It is considered quite probable that this type was the special work of itinerant embroiderers because of the nature of treatment of design. Unfettered by the tradition of any accepted school of design, these early embroiderers would work out the coat of arms of a patron, correct in charges and tinctures and complete with crests and mantling, then fill in the rest of his space with drawings from the life of the countryside around him, birds, animals, flowers and trees.

How Columbus Made an Egg Stand on One End

The story of how Columbus made an egg stand on end rests on the authority of the Italian historian Benzo, observes a writer in the Washington Star.

It is recorded that while Columbus was at Barcelona, just before his second voyage, Pedro Gonzalez de Mendoza, the grand cardinal of Spain, holding the highest rank of any subject in the land, invited the navigator to a banquet, at which he was assigned the most honorable seat. One of the courtiers, who was jealous of the honor, asked Columbus whether he thought any one else could have discovered the Indies. Columbus made no reply, but invited each of the guests to see whether he could make an egg stand on one end. All tried in vain. Columbus then struck the egg gently on the table to break the shell, leaving it standing on the broken part. In this way, he illustrated the fact that it would be very simple for others to follow the path to the New World now that he had pointed the way.

How Cave Men Made Paint

Near the town of Les Eyzies in Southern France is a famous cave, where exists evidence that human beings lived and died there 25,000 years ago. These cave dwellers were known as "Reindeer Men." On the walls of this cave there remain paintings of prehistoric animals in bright colors as vivid as if they had just been painted. These paintings indicate that the reindeer men possessed a high degree of artistic skill and knew how to make excellent paint by grinding the pigment with oil. To make their paint they used simple colors from the earth—red, brown, yellow and black—and mixed them with animal fats or oils in vessels made from the lower limbs of the reindeer.

How to Preserve Nut Meats

Nut meats may be canned in glass fruit jars and prepared in a water bath canner as follows: Fill the jars with nut meats, adjusting but not tightening the glass lids and rubbers. Set the jars in either a clothes boiler or large kettle with a rack on the bottom. Use enough water to reach almost to the top and boil for 15 or 20 minutes. Then seal the jars, leaving them in the water until it begins to cool. Store in a dark room and the processed meats will keep fresh even in hot weather.

How "Viola" Is Played

Called the "viola" a musical instrument that is a whole orchestra in one has been perfected at Leningrad, Russia, by the inventor, Vladimir A. Gurov and the young composer, Lucien M. Varvich. The player twirls a dial and the viola turns into a bass viol, another twirl and it becomes a guitar, still another and it is a flute, and so on. Besides its ability to reproduce faithfully almost any musical instrument.

How Plays Were Enlivened

The "mysteries," or religious plays of the Middle Ages were often enlivened with a bit of fun to keep the spectators in good humor. Beelzebub seems to have been the principal comic actor, assisted by a merry troupe of under-devils who, with a variety of noises, strange gestures and contortions of the body, made the length and dullness of the speeches in the play more endurable.

Girl Scouts Organize For Spring Activities

The Girl Scouts held their regular meeting last Friday evening at their headquarters, and enlisted twenty new girls in the troop. The regular scouts, already having passed tests were on hand to assist in the work of enrolling the new girls. Mrs. Edith Stevens and Miss Rosalie Chadwick are the official leader of the Troop; Mrs. Stevens, Captain, and Miss Chadwick, first lieutenant. The troop committee is composed of Mrs. Jas. Chaffey, Mrs. J. W. Mason, Mrs. B. J. White, Mrs. Horace Larkin and Mrs. John Seng, at the house of the regulars. The twenty new girls were organized to stand at "activities," which are held at the Legion. The troop committee is also planning the spring picnic, to be held at the Legion. Both scouts and the troop committee took the pledge.

The work has started off in a most promising manner, and the troop leaders and committee are busy now perfecting the troop requirements and laying plans for a successful year. The Troop meets next Friday evening—March 4th at the Legion Hut at seven o'clock. Further registration of new girls will be carried on, work assigned those already enlisted so that they may soon pass tests for ranking membership. Former scouts on roll will review their work under an instructor so that they may refresh themselves as to scout activities. New girls from ten thru fourteen years of age may join by applying for membership, and on submitting with Mrs. Stevens the Captain of the troop. The outlook now is that before final enrollment is completed that there will be two full troops of thirty two girls each.

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Commercial Fishing Rules and Regulations
Passed at the Meeting of the Board of the Department of Conservation and Development at Raleigh, N. C. January 18th and 19th, 1938.

143. (Amended)—It shall be unlawful to set pound nets outside of the following boundaries: Beginning at the southeast corner of what is known as the ten mile limit and running south three-quarters west to a point off Little Kinnakeet on the twelve foot curve nine and three-quarter miles from the beginning; thence southwest three quarters south six miles to a point on the twelve foot curve off North Point Beacon; thence northwest by west two thousand yards; thence northeast three-quarters north six miles to a point off Little Kinnakeet two thousand yards from the twelve foot curve; thence north three-quarters east to the southwest corner of what is known as the ten mile limit; thence east two thousand yards to the beginning.

144. (Amended) It shall be unlawful to take or catch any fish or shrimp with trawl nets of any kind inside of a line drawn from the bell buoy on the point off the breakwater at Cape Lookout to Bell's Island.

145. (Amended) It shall be unlawful to set anchor nets in the inland waters of North Carolina without having a buoy at each end of said net consisting of four English corks painted white.

147. (Amended) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to trawl for shrimp in any of the inland waters of North Carolina or in the Atlantic Ocean within three miles of the beach or ocean shore between the first day of April and the first day of July.

149. It shall be unlawful to take fish with trawl nets within three miles of any inlet.

150. It shall be unlawful to haul nets of any kind more than 1000 yards in length in Roanoke Sound, Croatan Sound, or Pamlico Sound, and their tributaries.

83. (Amended) It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to set, fish, have set or fished any pound nets north of a line running from Long Shoal River to the flash light in the mouth of Cape Channel between January 1st and February 1st, or to set any gill nets in said territory between January 1st and January 25th, or to set any pound nets in said territory between April 15th and June 1st; or to set any gill nets south of said line between December 15th and January 21st, or to set any gill nets in said territory between December 15th and January 20th, or to set any pound nets in said territory between April 15th and June 1st, or to set any gill nets in said territory between April 10th and June 1st; provided nothing contained in this rule shall be construed to apply to pound nets set in the Atlantic Ocean or to 1-8 inch bar pound nets set in Pamlico Sound south of Stumpy Point Bay: Provided further, that the Fisheries Commissioner is hereby authorized and empowered to issue permits revocable at his pleasure to set pound nets and haul seines in that portion of Albemarle Sound and its tributaries west of a line from the mouth of Alligator River to the mouth of Little River for the purpose of taking herring until May 10th upon the following conditions only, that the owners of said nets to whom permits are issued sign the following agreement to-wit: We, the undersigned owners of pound nets and seines agree with each other and the Department of Conservation and Development that we will not take, have taken or be a party to taking, shad in said nets and we further agree that we will carry dip net in each boat and will promptly remove any shad that may be taken and place them back in the water, and we further agree that upon the request of the Department of Conservation and Development that we will deliver any ripe shad to any agent of the fish hatchery at our nets, if requested to do so by any agent of the Department of Conservation and Development.
