Famous Fishing Area Will Be Developed



THIS AIR-VIEW OF Cape Lookout which is republished in The Beaufort News through the courtesy of The News and Observer, shows an area which is destined to be developed in a big way as a fishing and summer resort. Nearby at the Government Breakwater F. M. Simmons and associates plan to build a fishing pier 600 feet long which will be ready for patrons during the late Spring of 1939. Majorities Average From 200 to 500 For Democrats

Tuesday Elections marked another Democratic victory in Carteret County and throughout the State of North Carolina. But in this coastal county the majorities in some cases were not so overwhelming as in previous Elections of recent years.

As we go to press today the complete canvass of votes had not been made by the Board of Elections, but a clear consensus of how most of the precincts voted and the approximate majorities was obtained by The Beaufort News as the returns came in on Tuesday night. In next week's edition of The Beaufort News will be published a complete and official tabulated vote table of the Elections on Tuesday. The tabulated vote for the county officials which is run on page 1 today is not official but is approximately correct.

Although the Democratic Party of Carteret County under the leadership of Irvin W. Davis saw victory for their candidates, the majorities were not so overwhelming as the tabulated vote will show. D. M. Clark for solicitor, Fred I. Sutton and John D. Larkins Jr., for 7th District State Senatorial did not have Republican opposition so their total vote in Carteret will not be given until next week. Reynolds for U. S. Senate carried a good majority in Carteret over his opponent Charles Jonas, Congressman Graham A. BEFORE the days of carefully studied and rigidly followed schedules for infant welfare which are prevalent today, the mothers of the old school believed that the right and proper way to keep a baby happy was to carry him about with them practically all day long everywhere they went. This kept their right hand occupied so constantly that they changed the buttoning of their garments from the natural right side to the left in order that they could still hold their baby and button their clothes in the same motion.
