

FSCC TO NEXT MONDAY

County Agent Sends Instructions To Growers

Couny Agent John Lassigrowers who have requested FS-CC assistance in marketing their potatoes, and others too, County Agent Lassiter has sent out form letters giving general information relative to grading. The pota-

"The cars will be loaded at Huntley's siding from 8 o'clock in the morning until 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The FSCC will purchase U. S. No. 1s, which are as follows: Each potato shall not be less than 1 3-4 inches in diameter and shall not exceed 10 inches in length. The minimum weight shall not be less than three ounces. In no case shall the weight exceed 24 ounces and the potatoes must be fairly clean.."

"I would advise you to bring only potatoes that will fall within these instructions because your potatoes will be inspected before you place them in the car," the farmers were advised in the letter from County Agent Lassiter.
