

AN ORDINANCE with Respect to the issuance of \$567,000 Bonds of the Town of Beaufort, Carteret County, North Carolina.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Beaufort, Carteret County, North Carolina, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the following described indebtedness of the Town of Beaufort, including any part thereof which may have heretofore or may hereafter be reduced to judgment, be refunded:

all of said indebtedness having been incurred for necessary expenditures of the Town of Beaufort constituting special purposes within the meaning of Section 7, Article VII of the Constitution, and being hereby expressly recognized as the valid and binding indebtedness of said town.

SECTION 2. That to refund said indebtedness there be issued bonds of the Town of Beaufort in the amount of \$467,000, to be known as "General Refunding Bonds", and that to fund interest on said outstanding bonds accruing to July 1, 1939, there shall be issued bonds in the amount of \$100,000, to be known as "Interest Funding Bonds".

The General Refunding Bonds shall bear interest at one and one-half per cent per annum for the first three years, two per cent for the next succeeding seven years, two and one-half per cent for the next succeeding five years, three per cent for the next succeeding five years, four per cent for the next succeeding five years, and four and one-half per cent thereafter until paid.

SECTION 3. To pay principal of and interest on said bonds permitted ad valorem taxes are hereby levied on all taxable property in the Town of Beaufort, and said tax shall be extended annually at a maximum rate of one dollar on each hundred dollars assessed value...

SECTION 4. It is hereby estimated that the shortest period in which the indebtedness herein authorized to be refunded and funded can be finally paid without making it unduly burdensome upon the taxpayers of the Town of Beaufort is thirty-five years.

SECTION 5. That said refunding and funding bonds may, in the discretion of the Board of Commissioners, be calculated by suit filed in the Superior Court of Carteret County, and after approval of the Local Government Commission and validation, if it be determined so to validate said bonds, said refunding and funding bonds shall be delivered in exchange for proper amounts of indebtedness authorized to be refunded and funded as hereinabove provided.

SECTION 6. A statement of the indebtedness of the Town of Beaufort has been filed with the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

SECTION 7. That this ordinance shall be published once in each of two consecutive weeks after its final passage, and that there shall be appended to such publication a certificate by the Town Clerk in the form required by Section 2944, North Carolina Code.

SECTION 8. That all ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its final passage and shall not be submitted to the voters of the town.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 15th day of April, 1940, and was first published on the 18th day of April, 1940.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its final publication.

Home-Made Brooder Costs \$5 to \$7.50

A home-made lamp brooder that will accommodate from 50 to 60 chicks can be constructed for as little as \$5.00 to \$7.50, says C. F. Parrish, poultry extension specialist of N. C. State College. It is of simple design, easy to operate, and is heated by one to three amps, depending upon the severity of the weather.

Plans for building a home-made lamp brooder may be obtained from county farm or home agents, or from the Extension Poultryman at State College, Raleigh, upon request for Blue Print No. 46.

Parrish said the lamp brooder is intended for operation in a protected place, such as under a wood shed or wagon shed, preferably where the wind will not blow directly on the brooder, yet the sun will shine directly on the sun porch attached.

Here are general directions the specialist gives for such a poultry unit: The brooder is constructed in two parts. The bottom section houses the lamps; the top section accommodates the chicks. The tray that separates the two sections is covered with 26 or 28 gauge tin. The tin side is placed downward, next to the flame of the lamp, and the top part of the tray is covered over with one inch or more of sharp, coarse, dry sand. The chimney of the lamp should be one to one and one-half inches below the metal tray which divides the top and bottom sections.

The tray should be kept covered with sand at all times. This acts not only as a conductor of heat, but also as a litter. It should be kept clean at all times. A sun porch is attached, and after the first few days the chicks may be allowed to run on it in mild weather. The roof, or top of the brooder may be covered with tin or roofing paper.

Tobacco

Barring serious blue mold attacks and inclement weather, tobacco plants should be available for transplanting in Wilson County between May 1 and 10, says assistant farm agent J. A. Marsh.

A special Pitt County farm committee has been appointed to make a careful study of practices and methods that farmers might use to produce cotton more economically.

Answers To Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: When is the best time to plant cotton in the Piedmont section?

ANSWER: The best planting dates for this area are from April 20 to 30 and up to May 5 in the western portion and along the northern edge of the Cotton Belt. Cotton planted early has a much better chance under boll weevil conditions and where seasonal conditions warrant it is recommended that planting be made as early as possible.

QUESTION: How soon after birth is it safe to feed grain and hay to dairy calves?

ANSWER: Small amounts of both grain and hay should be offered the calf at two weeks of age or when the substitution of skim-milk for whole milk begins. At first the calf will eat only a small handful of grain daily, but this amount can be gradually increased until the animal is receiving around three pounds a day at six months of age.

QUESTION: What is the proper planting distance for sweet potato plants?

ANSWER: The plants should be spaced 12 inches apart in rows from three to three and one-half feet apart. Close planting reduces the number of "fumbos" and also reduces the losses from stem rot. Where the crop is to be harvested for the early market the planting should be at least 18 inches in rows three feet apart.

Pasture

Through the use of lime and phosphate, K. M. Byrd of Peppers in Mitchell County has improved his pastures at least 50 per cent in the last three years, reports Farm Agent F. L. Woodard.

and indications are that the 20 or more acres he has devoted to flower culture will be a blaze of beauty at an early date. His farm was formerly known as "Sunnyside Flower Farm," but he changed the name to Gulf Stream Gardens a few months ago, because he puts it, "After all it was the nearness of the Gulf Stream to the coast, affording an ideal climate for flower growing, that brought me here in the first place. Mr. Averey came to Carteret from Ohio. He is the largest grower of flowers in the county. This week he predicts that gladiolus would probably be a couple of weeks later this year than in previous years due to the abnormally cold winter.
