#### Many Re-Register To Vote During Past Week

Unless they change their party affiliation, no Republican will be permitted to vote for a Democratic candidate, and no Democrat will be permitted to vote for Republican candidates in the coming Primary, it was emphasized today by D. W. Morton, chairman of the Board of Elections of Carteret County. Incidentally, during the part years ring the past week, according to Chairman Morton, a number of persons who had not voted since 1934, re-reg-istered and listed their party afiliation, so that they may vote on election day for their favorite candidates.

If any person wishes to change their party affiliation so that they may vote for either a Democrat or a Republican candidate, as the case may be, that person must before the end of Registration Period (advertised elsewhere in this edition) take an oath before the Registrar of their respective precinct. The names of all persons who have not voted since 1934-or during 1936 and 1938, are being advertised for two weeks according to to vote in the coming Primary. These persons who re-register must declare their party affiliation said Chairman Morton when they regis-
