BIRD-LORE Furnished By N. C. Bird Club The Catbird

Dr. C. S. and H. H. Brimley recorded in 1919 that they had observed the catbird at Raleigh only four times in winter during the twenty-six years of observation. On the other hand one was observed near Brevard during the 1938 Christmas Census, one at Winston-Salem on January 7, 1940, and it has been noted at Chapel Hill in every census of late years. It is sparingly present in the east in most winters.

If YOU see the catbird this winter, from October 21 to April 16, please notify the CHAT, the North Carolina Bird Club publication, 2508 Clark Avenue, Raleigh.

The other members of this family in North Carolina are the Mockingbird, resident in central and eastern Carolina and occasionally in the mountains, and the Brown Thrasher, which is found in the whole state in summer and which winters regularly in the eastern section and irregularly in the central portion.

Description of the Catbird: Slate gray with wings, tail and crown black; under tail coverts chestnut.

Farmers of the Coastal Plain should plant Kobe lespedeza; those in the Piedmont can get satisfactory results from Korean lespedeza on better soils, advises E. C. Blair, agronomist of the State College Extension Service. Korean is not adapted to the Coastal Plain he says.

and high price of Kope variety seed will undoubtedly cause Coastal Plain farmers to sow Korean instead. "These farmers are likely to be disappointed," he declared. "Korean lespedeza makes a very weak growth on most Coastal Plain soils, especially on the very sandy and very acid soils."

an acre. Thirty or more pounds of seed should be used when broadcast. Blair suggests that Coastal Plain farmers use soybeans or cowpeas for a hay crop if Kobe lespedeza seed cannot be obtained. Good hay varieties of soybeans are Ototan, Clemson, and Laredo, while Iron and Brahm rank among the best of the cowpeas. They are also resistant to wilt.

For best results in the Coastal Plain, sow soybeans in June and fertilize with 400 pounds of 2-8-5 or 0-8-6 fertilizer per acre. Whether or not to use 2 per cent nitrogen depends upon the fertility of the soil.

The rate of seeding when broadcast should be one bushel of cowpeas, three pecks of small soybean seed, or one and one-half to two bushels of large-seeded soybeans per acre. Blair recommends about one-half these amounts when planting in narrow rows.

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
