Every pre-school child will have a part in the festival.

## LIVESTOCK LAW TO AID FARMER

### Protection Given By Statute Explained By Veterinarian

A Greater protection of North Carolina's livestock industry will become possible under a law enacted by the 1941 General Assembly "requiring that all animals sold at livestock markets must carry a disease-free certificate unless purchased for immediate slaughter," Dr. William Moore, chief veterinarian of the State Department of Agriculture, reports.

"Another feature of the livestock market law is the requirement that livestock market operators must post a \$2,000 bond to guarantee payment for livestock they sell at buying centers," Dr. Moore explained.

"While this new law protecting the livestock industry will not bring immediate results in curbing the spread of all contagious and infectious diseases of animals, it is a law looking toward greater protection for an industry destined to replace gaps left through the curtailment of cash crops."

Dr. Moore emphasized that "the livestock market law has the sanction of a majority of auction operators in the State, most all of whom recognize that if they are to prosper, they must give protection to the purchaser of livestock for breeding and feeding purposes."

Other major features of the livestock market law, outlined by Dr. Moore, include provisions for:

1. Licensing and supervision of markets by the Department.
2. Requiring proper facilities by operators for handling and segregating livestock at markets.
3. Requiring cleaning and disinfection of markets.

infection of market centers and trucks "to assure the best condition for sale of livestock."

1. Regulating the transportation and sale of disease animals.  
5. Authorization for the State Board of Agriculture to make such other rules and regulations "to further protect the livestock industry from spread of livestock diseases."

The livestock market law becomes effective July 1. Meanwhile, copies of the statute are being printed and will be furnished each market operator in the State within the next 30 days.

## Defense Bonds

A defense Bond may be purchased May 1, or thereafter, for \$18.75. In ten years, this bond will be worth \$25.00. This is an increase of 33 1/3 per cent, equal to an annual interest return of 2.0 per cent, compounded semi-annually. Any time after sixty days from the date of purchase, the bond may be redeemed for cash, in accordance with a table of redemption values printed on the face of the bond.

To spread investments widely among all the people in America, a limit of \$5,000 has been set on the amount of these bonds to be bought by any one person in one year. The bonds are in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000, all of which are sold for 75 per cent of their maturity value and all of which mature in ten years.

For larger investors who can afford to purchase up to \$50,000 worth of bonds a year, the Treasury Department has issued two additional kinds of Defense Savings Bonds, but these will be sold only through banks and by direct mail from Washington, D. C. They are intended for associations, trustees and corporations, as well as individual purchasers.

For the smaller investor who wants to buy a Government Bond on an easy payment plan, the post office will have a new series of Postal Savings Stamps, at 10c, 25c, 50c, \$1, and \$5. Each purchaser of any Savings Stamp higher than 10c will be given, free of charge, an attractive pocket album, in which to paste his stamps until he has enough to buy a \$25 bond or one of higher denomination. Thirty million of these albums are now being prepared.

The cover design of the album is in color, featuring a United States battleship and an eagle bearing the American flag. On the back cover is a painting of the Minute Man statue by Daniel Chester French, which symbolizes the American citizen ever alert in defense of his country. The inscription is "America on Guard".

Secretary Morgenthau said that even a boy or girl who saved 10c to buy a Savings Stamp would help the country. He added that "you can safeguard your own money and your own future, while helping the national defense, by buying United States Savings Bonds now."

## Legions Of 4-H'ers To Beautify Rural America This Year

Beautifying rural home and public grounds on a nationwide scale never before attained in 4-H Club history is under way by thousands of boys and girls. Clubs between 10 and 21 in this and 39 other states are participating under supervision of the extension service. Communities all over the nation are being awakened to the beauty within their means in the year-around contest made possible by Mrs. Chas. R. Walgreen, garden enthusiast of Illinois.

All that farm boys and girls need to make their surroundings inviting is to be shown how," states Mrs. Walgreen. "Tools and materials are at hand or near every

farm. Labor and a plan only are needed, and the latter is provided through club leaders."

In proof of her statement she calls attention to the records submitted by clubsters last year: A Georgia girl transformed an old log house in a barren field into an attractive place in three years. In his first year of some ground beautification, a New Hampshire lad leveled an old driveway, filled the yard, pruned shrubs and planted annuals and perennials. A 14-year-old Mississippi girl built a walk, a lily pool, driveway and rock garden; planted a hedge, rose garden and shade trees, and grew pet plants for the porch. A Utah clubster planted sunnys along a driveway, and shrubs and flowers around the back lawn to screen it for an outdoor rest place. A youthful Wisconsin miss planted 4,019 annuals and perennials, 271 trees and 1,200 bulbs according to plan.

Gold medals will be awarded to county winners. One representative of each state blue award group will receive a gold watch, and all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November will be given to the outstanding winners in each of the four extension sections and two at large.
