

Winter Legume Seed

With the national shortage of winter legume seed, it has been very difficult for the Carteret Agricultural Conservation Assn. to obtain seed. However, they have obtained a limited amount of vetch at 9 1-2 cents per pound. Austrian Winter Peas at 5 cents per pound, and Italian Rye Grass at .56 cents per pound, for distribution under the Grant of Aid Program which will enable farmers who are obtaining these seed to complete their Soil Building goal for 1941. Approximately \$30,000.00 is yet to be earned urder the Soil Conservation Program in Carteret County for 1941 with the fiscal year ending Oct. 31,

The average soil building unit is worth \$7.20 each that has not been earned thus far.

Those farmers interested in obtaining Grant of Aid seed such as Vetch, Austrian Winter Peas and Italian Rye Grass should call by the County Farm Agent's office and execute an A C P 64 for their

Sheriff R. B. Lane of Craven ounty says the "time has come" when the service stations, night clubs and other spots out in the ural sections of the county are either going to "clean up or close up" and he said Thursday that he intended to see that they did one of the two-and right away.

Complaint after complaint has been received by the sheriff recently from residents of the sections in which certain service stations which allow congregating on the part of men and women and of night clubs where there is a continual round of roistering, dancing and other forms of nuisance and the citizenry is demanding that prompt action be taken in high and low temperatures on to relieve a situation which has become almost unbearable.

Wilmington Yards Lav Keels Of Two More Liberty Ships

The vessels, built for reasonable speed with minimum horsepower, come under a contract which the company has with the maritime commission. There are under construction 312 such cargo ships of which 37 will be constructed at the Wilmington yards.

Although a number of keels have been laid here, the first sev eral months ago, it has not been announced when the initial unit will be launched.

The maritime commission has selected names for the first three vessels to slide off the Wilmington ways, however. They will be Nathanael Greene, Francis Marion and John C. Calhoun after two famous Revolutionary war generalls and the famed South Carolina statesman. lina statesman.
