The picture has changed though, and now I get three and four letters every day from people saying "you were right," etc., etc. Even the mag-azine TIME called AP in Charlotts to get a story about the proposal originating in Beaufort to huild air raid shelters back in 1936. AP called me long distance one night recently and talked for some 20 minutes getting data about what they termed "A person who had such foresight" for air raid shelters. I regretted that I had to tell them the idea was heckled out of existence, even though it was Project No. 12 on a long range program list compiled five years ago.
