construction of fortifications or defense bases which would close this open door. At that time we did not get to first base with the idea. Within a year however the picture had changed and 18 months after we urged the government to close what we termed as the open doorway for enemy invasion work started on Camp Davis and later Marine Barracks New River, and then Cunningham Field and in the meantime Fort Bragg was enlarged and we were on the brink of War. Still the open doorway has not been closed and a wise enemy, when they are ready to attack, will more than likely strike from the back door of military objectives in the industrial centers of the north, i.e., they will come thru from the ocean via an unprotected and isolated coastal section and attack from the landward instead of from the seaward. Anyway that is our opinion.

NO ONE seemed to take the air raid shelter and "fortifications for coast" ideas we expressed very seriously. As matter of fact we took a lot of ribbing about making such suggestions at public meetings and through our editorials. The picture has changed though, and now I get three and four letters every day from people saying "you were right," etc., etc. Even the magazine TIME called AP in Charlotte to get a story about the proposal originating in Beaufort to build air raid shelters back in 1936. AP called me long distance one night recently and talked for some 20 minutes getting data about what they termed "A person who had such foresight" for air raid shelters. I regretted that I had to tell them the idea was hekkled out of existence, even though it was Project No. 12 on a long range program list compiled five years ago.

about will do no one any good and may set a bad example to those easily frightened. Know the meanings of the various kinds of warning signals. Know where you want to go, think over in your own mind how far it is, your route, how many streets you cross and what turns must be made to avoid being lost. "No smoking" in the open should be the invariable rule. Always pass and keep to the right, using the same courtesy and rules you should use in operating your automobile. The man approaching from your right has right of way. Be careful not to push persons walking next to the curb as they may be struck by cars running close to the curb using it as a guide line. Look down and not upward so that you can see the white stripes on posts at barricades and obstacles on the ground. If planes are overhead, keep your head down as many upturned faces make the streets where crowds are congregated very conspicuous from the air, especially if streets are lighted by flares of burning buildings.
