Roland Styron of the U. S. N., spent the past week with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roland Styron.

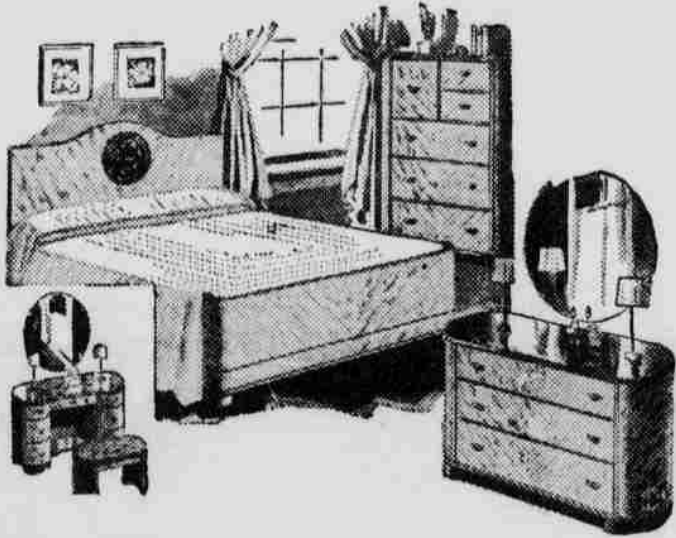
