SOMEWHERE IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC-Working with assemblyline precision, ground men load bombs into a TBF at a secret coral line precision, ground men load bombs into a TBF at a secret coral island air field—one of the jumping off places for the current South Pacific Allied offensive. Fourteen days before this bomber field (shown in photo above) was completed there was nothing on this spot but cocoanut palms and jungle. Cord-wood fashion, bundles of steel landing mat are unloaded from ship to beach to air field and many sections have planes rolling on them by nightfall of the same day. Two Children Hurt In Bus Accident Still in Hospital


