plant from the plant bed to the field usually results in the failure of the tobacco producer to get a stand. It usually takes around ten days to two weeks under average weather conditions for the blue mold to leave the bed and the tobacco plants to grow out sufficiently for setting in the field.

Tobacco blue mold is a fungus disease that over winters in old plant beds or any other organic material that might be nearby. It is easily carried from one field or farm to another by insects, wind, animals, such as dogs or even by people who might examine one infested bed and go over to observe their neighbor's bed.

The tobacco blue mold disease can easily be controlled by the use of paradichlorobenzene crystals at the rate of two to three pounds of these crystals sprinkled over the plant bed canvas just before sun down. A heavy cloth such as unbleached sheeting must be put on over the canvas to prevent escape of the fumes. The side wall of the bed must be tight also to hold the fumes in the bed. The heavier covering must be removed early the next morning to prevent scalding the plants.

LABOR CAMP

Rapid progress has been made on the construction of the Carteret County Farm Labor Camp according to a report by R. M. Williams.

C. B. Collier, U. S. Engineer from Raleigh and now employed by the War Food Administration, arrived in the county Wednesday of last week to begin the ground work of plotting the buildings. Construction and plumbing contractors are now on the camp grounds with their crews of workers putting up the necessary buildings and fixtures to accommodate approximately three hundred people.

One hundred and fifty Bahaman workers have already been contracted, to arrive on the camp site the first of June. It is anticipated that approximately the same number of migratory workers will also arrive from Florida about the same time. Both the Bahaman and the migratory workers will be housed in tents on the camp site. There are other farmers in the trucking area of the county who have their own housing facilities to accommodate a sizeable number of agricultural workers during the harvest season.

make your mouth water — nor theirs), soon a poker game is underway or movies — most often a war picture! These deep sleep under woolen blankets after the hot day, but troubled sleep in which happenings of the day cannot be put away — the plane going down in flames, the wounded chap taken from his plane.

"How do they take care of these wounded. When you were injured, for instance?"

"A flight surgeon is always at the field with an ambulance, and a crash crew with fire fighting equipment. The crash crew take care of the fire, if any, cut the pilot's straps and take him out, and rush him to the hospital at the Base."

"What sort of hospital at Poughkeepsie?"

"A dugout in the ground with logs built around — just a big fox hole, dirt floor, cot, a surgeon, X-ray equipment — everything we need."

"How do you fly, navigate, and shoot all at the same time?"

"Navigation problems are worked out before we leave. I set my compass, fly by dead reckoning. Covering the same territory repeatedly there are certain landmarks and with a map, I can recognize islands even at night. The machine guns in the wings of the plane are fired by a button on the stick."

Robert's story like that of other home boys is distorted in re-

telling because the writer emphasizes his story. Actually most of the things he tells are about Lt. Tommy Blackburn, Annapolis man, "the Skipper" who "is always wanting to do something extra," to hang behind after the action is over to catch a Jap unawares or strafe a ship; "the Skipper" whose squadron has never failed to complete a mission no matter what the weather; "the Skipper" who helped them rig devices to carry 500-pound bombs and drop them on targets on Rabaul" just for the fun of it when there were no more

planes to fight. The squadron, "Blackburn's Irregulars," made up of 45 pilots destroying 7 Jap cargo ships, 17 barges, 154 planes plus 72 probables, has set a record for damage done to the enemy by a fighter group.

"When will it be over?"

"Fighting is pretty well over in the Philippines this summer, and probably attempt to cut through the Malayan Peninsula and cut off Singapore soon. I don't know — maybe we'll finish by the end of '45."
