The Rev. Mr. Forbes, Rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in this town, is expected to deliver a discourse appropriate to the occasion next Sunday, it being Easter—and all who may have the pleasure of hearing this learned divine will no doubt be pleased and edified.

The sidewalk on Front Street as completed now reaches from Market Street to the east side of Mr. C. Clawson's Bakery. We trust the work of improvement thus begun will continue until Beaufort can boast of her pleasant streets.

Laura Gertrude. This well known passenger boat now owned by Messrs. Taylor & Buckman is undergoing thorough repair, and is being made ready for the Summer season. Mr. M. C. Phelps and Lewis Washington are doing the work.

On Tuesday last a "lookout" was placed in position on the fish house of W. F. Dill, whose sole duty will be to watch for the coming of the Rome and Noah. Our old pilots will have to be on the watch, for the old man above referred to is at his post early and late and his face is constantly turned seaward.

Thanks to Mr. John Johnson, for a delicious supper of Stone crabs, enjoyed by the writer on Monday last.

A couple of large porpoises, measuring about eight feet in length were caught in Town creek one day last week the first for some time that have been captured in this neighborhood.

The barque Gulchings, which went ashore on the rip on Tuesday 21st ulto, was floated on Sunday last and was towed to the dock at Morehead City. About one half the cargo had to be taken on before the vessel could be moved, and some minor accidents occurred, the chief of which was a casualty to the steam tug Blanche, which ran on an anchor, piercing a hole through her bottom and causing her to sink almost immediately. She was raised on Monday last and towed to Morehead City, where a diver from the Baker Salvage Co., succeeded in repairing the breach.

Pilot Ed Mayo was sent for from Charleston S. C., to bring up the steamer Mischief. He arrived on Wednesday last and the captain says that part of the passage was quite stormy. They were compelled to stop in at Smithville, by stress of weather. Captain Barnett compliments Mr. Mayo very highly as a seaman and pilot. The steamer is owned by Henry Diston of Philadelphia, the noted saw manufacturer, and is used for a pleasure yacht.

PERSONALS.

Capt. James E. Howland of this place has been called to Norfolk to take a tug from that city to Wilmington, this State.

Mr. John D. Davis returned from Raleigh on Tuesday last, bringing back all his baggage, but leaving his title.

Miss Mary Rumley left last week for Charleston, S. C. to remain for an indefinite period, she will be greatly missed especially by her intimate friends and the home circle, for she possesses many endearing qualities.

Miss Dollie Jones, who has been absent for some time on a visit, returned this week.

Hon. George Smith of this township was in town on Thursday last. He has been in poor health for a month or two past but we are pleased to say he is now improving.

The Collector of Customs has received invoices of two more vessels loaded with steel rails for the Midland Railroad as follows: The Rome, containing 500 tons cleared from Cardiff, Wales, February 28th, and the Noah, with 675 tons, cleared February 28th. They will probably be here next week or the week after.

These two cargoes complete the complement of 5000 tons, which was the amount purchased by the Midland. We trust the vessels will arrive safely and we are sure that the pilots will be very careful that they reach the dock without accident.

A protracted meeting was held at Smyrna last week and part of the week before under the auspices of Rev. Mr. Cashwell of the Baptist Church the good results of which were 10 conversions, nine of the converts having been publicly immersed on Sunday last.

Almost a Conflagration

At the close of the lecture on Friday night last, and during the confusion incident in getting the house emptied of the large audience, a table containing three lamps was tipped over and an explosion occurred. Mr. Wm. F. Howland, Mr. R. R. Roberson, Mr. Smith and Mr. S. D. Parson, happened to be near the lamps, and by the sacrifice of their overcoats were enabled to smother the flames, else the entire building would have been consumed in a short time. These gentlemen were all more or less burned, but fortunately not seriously. Eye brows and whiskers were scorched, and hands blistered, but a panic was prevented and the building was saved.

Lost a Finger.

Mr. William Weekly while cutting with a hatchet on Sunday last, struck his little finger on the left hand and entirely severed it from that member. The finger flew to one side, and strange to say has not yet been found. It is supposed that it was caught and devoured at once by a chicken, several of which were near.

The large congregations that greeted the Rev. N. M. Journey, in assuming the pastoral charge of Ann St. M. E. Church in this place, are still maintained and the interest manifested in the preaching of this able and earnest divine is evidently on the increase. In the morning of Sunday next—Easter—he will treat his hearers to a discourse on the Resurrection of Christ, and at night on the subject of "Life beyond the grave."

The town of Beaufort last year levied a tax on merchants of one tenth of one per cent on importations, which was thought by many, ourselves among the number a new departure, as we supposed that prior to that time stocks of goods were taxed as other personal property; but a casual examination of the town records a few days since in connection with another matter, revealed to us the fact that in 1866, the town commissioners, Messrs. W. B. Duncan, Wm. H. Piver, J. F. Delamar, C. S. Bell and James C. Davis passed an ordinance taxing merchants as follows: On each stock of dry goods and groceries under \$500, 00, \$2.00; over \$500 and under \$1000, \$4.00; over \$1000 and under \$2000, \$8.00; over \$2,000 and under \$4,000, \$12.00; over \$4,000 and under \$6,000, \$15.00; over \$6,000 and under \$12,000, \$20.00; over \$12,000, \$25.00. For each retail liquor store, \$25.00; for each dog, \$1.00; for each dry, \$2.50.

An item appeared in the Wilmington Star to the effect that some one killed a hog 10 months old which averaged in weight nearly 23 pounds for each month of his age. Mr. B. L. Jones of the firm of Chadwick & Jones in this town killed one, which was 12 months and 20 days old which weighed 455 pounds an average per month of a trifle less than 36 pounds. Carteret County is still ahead.

The tug boat Confidence, in attempting to enter the harbor last Thursday night without a pilot fouled with the red buoy and wrapped the chain several times around her propeller. She lay in the channel until Friday morning when she was towed up to the railroad wharf taking buoy, anchor and chain along with her. This is the second buoy taken from its place within a short time and we hope the buoy-tender will soon be along and replace all our buoys with first class ones as our harbor deserves.

Mr. James C. Davis slightly crippled himself while working in his flower yard last week. He manages to get about, but has for the time being lost some of his erect bearing.
