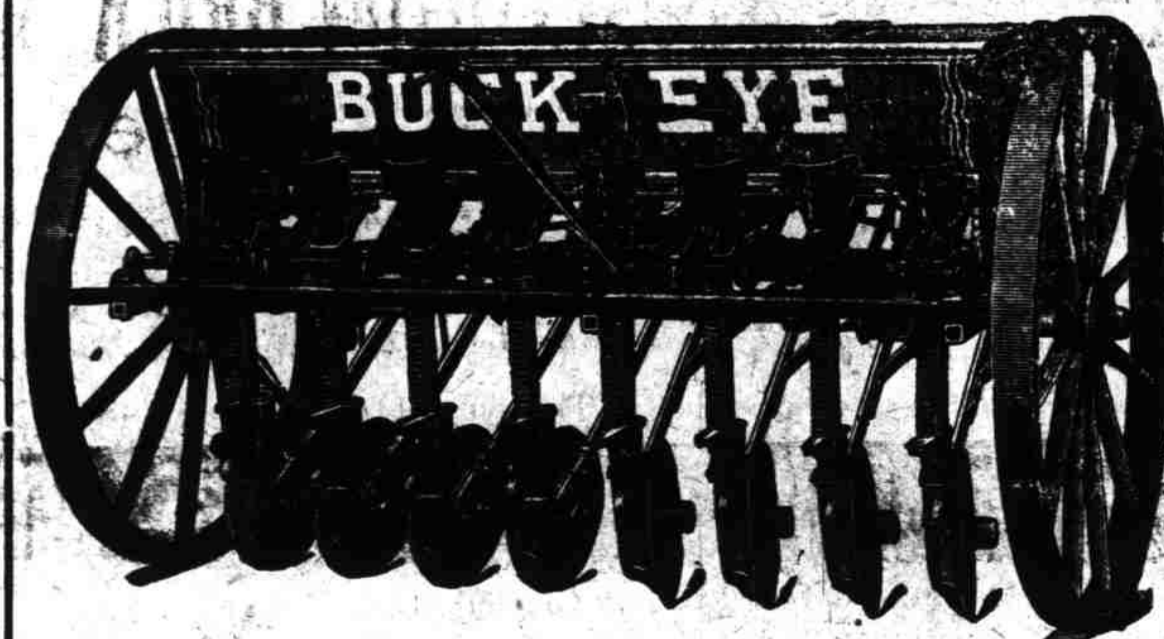
Last Popular Excursion of the Season to Asheville, N. C.

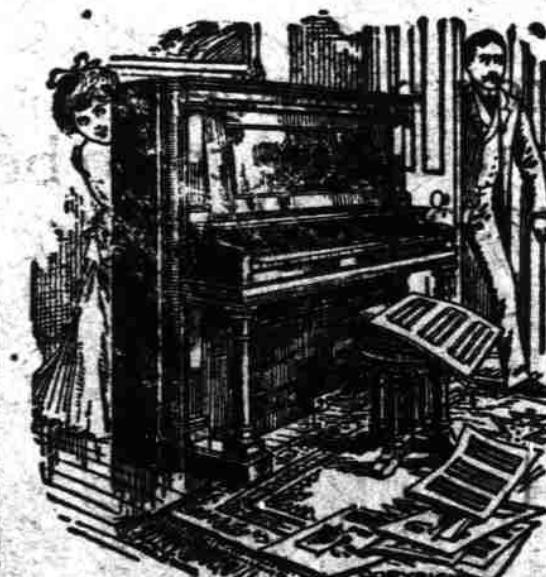
