Brief News Items.

A Montgomery, Ala., Sunday School superintendent has been requested to resign because he expressed the opinion that prohibition in his state is a farce.

In October the Southern Railway will string two copper circuits between Monroe, Va., and Greenvboro, N. C., to be used for train dispatching and the other for block offices.

William Macabee, the only surviving member of the crew of the old frigate Constitution, last Wednesday celebrated his one hundred and sixth birthday in the Naval Home in Philadelphia.

One person was burned to death, another instantly killed and a third seriously burned when an automobile, driven by John McLendon, ran off an eight foot embankment at Americus, Ga., early last Friday.

It is not Justice Harlan, now past his seventy-six birthday, who thinks of resigning from the United States Supreme Court. He is so vigorous and tireless that some of the younger member of the court cannot keep pace with him.

There are not enough captains and lieutenants in the American Army. Experts now say the shortage is little short of alarming, and that a large per cent of the desertions from the ranks are due to the constant shifting of the officers.

United States Treasurer Charles H. Treat has resigned. Mr. Treat says his resignation will take place some time in October. Lee McClung, the treasurer of Yale University, has been selected as treasurer of the United States, to succeed Charles H. Treat.

About 65,000 enumerators will be required to take the thirteenth decennial census of the United States which will go on record as April 15 1910. At that rate each enumerator on the average will have to gather the information sought for from about 1,200 persons.

Mexico's best tobacco lands are in the State of Vera Cruz. The so-called tobacco belt extends from the Tuxpan River, in the northern part of the state, to and beyond its southeastern boundary line, and up to the Republic of Guatemala. This belt is about 500 in length.

More than ten lives were lost and property worth \$2,000,000 was destroyed in the cyclone which recently swept over the province of Pinar Del Rio, Cuba. Communication between Havana and the storm area was cut off, and reports of damage are just reaching Havana.

The dead body of David R. Edwards, a farmer resident of Dorothy was found in the underbrush last week by George Greller, who was driving from Risley to Dorothy. The furious barking of his dog attracted his attention to the spot where the body was lying.

An interesting experiment is being made in the higher education of women at King's College, London. The idea is that there is just as much educational value in a careful study of the principle of managing the home and young children as in the course usually read for the taking of degree.

Philander C. Knox, Jr, twenty years old, son of Secretary of State Knox, was arraigned before Judge Howard B. Gorham in the Sixth District Court at Providence, R. I., last week, charged with breaking the Rhode Island speed laws. He pleaded guilty, and paid a fine of \$15 and costs.

The Corporation Court at Bristol Va., last week granted license to eleven firms and individuals to do a liquor business beginning October 1st, and on this account there was paid into the county treasury \$20,300. Further applications will be considered later. Bristol has been dry for two years.

L. R. Sires, express messenger on the Central of Georgia, was fired upon in his car near McIntyre, Ga., early last Friday morning by some person on the top of the car. He was shot through the transom robbery doubtless being the motive. Sires summoned help from the mail car but the man escaped.

A special grand jury at Charlottesville, Va., has indicted A. T. Snitzer, manager of Snitzer & Co., men's furnisher, for setting fire to a dwelling on August 30. On that day the store room in which Snitzer &

Co., were doing business, the second story of which was occupied as a dwelling, was found to be on fire and before the fireman got it under control the stock was destroyed. Snitzer is out on bail, the case to be heard at the next term of court.

Richard B. Carter, postmaster at Summerfield, Ala., a small village a short distance north of Selma, was assaulted and robbed of the postal funds by burglars and later found unconscious, according to the dispatch received by the chief postoffice inspector last Friday from Postmaster Scott of Selma.

A number of the French tariff commission having stated that cotton seed oil was injurious to the health and destroyed the abdominal tissues, Dr. Crawford, of the Bureau of Animal Industry, made experiments which indicated that "purified cottonseed oil is no more injurious than olive oil or cod liver oil."

The Clinch River coal mine, on the Big Creek branch of the Norfolk and Western, near Richlands, Va., is on fire, and so far every effort to extinguish the flames has proved futile. C. B. Orr, president of the farmers and merchants bank at Richmond, is president and general manager of the coal company.

After serving nearly 30 years of his life in prison on charges of counterfeiting and passing bogus money James O'Leary, alias "Jack Mulvey," an aged man, was sentenced in the United States district court at Philadelphia, Pa., last week to ten years in the government prison at Atlanta, Ga., on a similar charge. He pleaded guilty, but asked for clemency on account of his age.
