Professors and Politics.

At the annual meeting of the American Economic Association, which includes a large number of college professors in its membership some plain words were spoken by men who hitherto have been accounted mere theorists. They admit that man cannot live by general principles alone without some application, and the application depends upon individuals and circumstances to such a degree that the man trained merely in books is at a disadvantage.

They form a confession of insufficiency and admonition to a change of methods. For some 30 years or so there has been a class of men in this country known as professional reformers, who have provided all sorts of panaceas for our political ills. Some of the prescriptions have been taken by the public without the millenium being reached. We have the so-called Australian ballot, which hasn't done anything like what has been claimed for it. We have popular primaries without deposing leadership. We have been invited to try other remedies with the perfect assurance that they are cure-alls, and still here are complaints.

Now the eminent doctors of political science are admitting that they have ignored too much the essential element of human nature that there are some things which cannot be dealt with by mere formula. The confession is that the reformers themselves are without adequate data on which to base their theories. What seems to have been impressed upon these organizers of thought is that political leadership, or bossism, as it is called in some sections, endures in spite of all their efforts to the contrary.

Wheat Exports of Argentina.

The very surprising statement is made that Argentina is exporting more wheat than the United States. It is a consular report, and therefore worthy of credence. It is also predicted that the time is not distant when Canada will grow more wheat for export than our country, all which would appear to vindicate the opinion of Mr. James J. Hill, that soon the United States will be buying breadstuffs from abroad. That, however, is not likely until the tariff duty on wheat is materially reduced.

Last spring Indian corn was imported into New York from British South Africa, paid the duty, and successfully competed with corn from Iowa and Kansas with three cents the bushel to spare. The duty on wheat is 25 cents the bushel, while the duty on corn is five cents less.

It is asserted that in South Africa there is a corn belt equal to that of our own country, and it is virgin, as are the wheat belts of Argentina and Canada. The prime reason of the extravagant cost of living in our country is that political economy we have practiced, which invites and incorporates as a part of our population more than 1,000,000 foreigners a year. A secondary and very nearly as potent a cause is the monopolies that fix the prices of food and clothing.
