## Institute For Teachers

A County Institute for teachers will be held at GRAHAM, N. C., beginning JULY 4, 1910, and continuing two weeks. Section 4167 of the School Law says: "All public school teachers of any county in which such institute and school is conducted are hereby required to attend the same continuously during its session unless providentially hindered, and failure to attend the biennial institute and school shall debar any teacher so failing to attend continuously from teaching in any of the public schools of the State for a period of one year, or until such teacher shall have attended according to law some county institute and school as herein provided for in some other county."

You are required to bring all of the text-books used in the public schools through the primary and intermediate grades, as the institute will partake largely of the character of a school. For the primary work bring, in addition to the readers, some tablets and a pair of scissors.
