## A Sensible Departure.

All over the country we are hearing of new ideas in government, municipal as well as state and federal, and the trend of all of them, we are happy to note, is toward real service. A most sensible departure from established custom is that instituted by Governor Hadley, of Missouri, who has decided that instead of delivering the traditional message to the legislature, he will provide for a series of lectures by experts in economics and politics and agriculture, who will make known, after careful investigation, to the general assembly the needs of the various parts of the state.

This is real service, and there can be no doubt that Missouri will benefit largely from it. It would cause most governors of state a pang of regret to give up the opportunity of exploiting themselves in a message to the legislature, and it is plain that in his new departure Governor Hadley is actuated by high principles that are sound in conception and promise well in execution.

The average governor's message is not usually a helpful document. It is too often compact of mere words that are aimed, primarily, to convince the people what a grand and good political party it is that the governor has the honor to represent. The plan proposed by Governor Hadley is based of course, on the new ideal that is growing throughout the country, the ideal of government as a business.
