Greensboro, March 22.—Guilford officials are making a thorough search today for Mrs. O. L. Wombaugh, a pretty 19-year old bride of six months, and for whose alleged abduction Boyd H. Sing, an Oak Ridge student, was arrested here at midnight and is being held in default of \$2,000 bond.
Officers have reason to believe that Mrs. Wombaugh and Sing left Oak Ridge Wednesday night and went to High Point. Stories of previous improper relations are now being related by servants at Oak Ridge, where Mrs. Wombaugh had been on a visit recently.

The affair has created a sensation here and at Oak Ridge. Mr. Wombaugh is in the government forestry service and during a business absence his wife had been visiting at Oak Ridge. He was married last September, his bride being a noted beauty of the county and daughter of Mrs. J. L. Lambert, of Guilford College. She is one of the most striking young women of the county, is 19 years old, has a perfect complexion, raven black hair, and weighs about 125 pounds. Sing is a native of Florence, S. La Follette's High Tribute to His Wife

Senator La Follette pays the following tribute to his wife in the course of his autobiography, in the April American Magazine: "Mrs. La Follette and I were classmates at the University of Wisconsin, and naturally we had common interests. The first year of our married life, in order to strengthen myself in the law I was re-reading Kent and Blackstone at home evenings; and she joined me. This led later to her taking the law course as an intellectual pursuit. She never intended to practice. She was the first woman graduated from the Wisconsin University Law

School."
"On one occasion when my firm was overwhelmed with work at the Circuit, and the time was about to expire within which our brief should be served in a Supreme Court case, it having been stipulated that the case should be submitted without argument, I proposed to Mrs. La Follette that she prepare the brief. It was a case which broke new ground, and her brief won with the Supreme Court."
"About a year afterwards, Chief Justice Lyons in a group of lawyers, complimented me on the brief which my firm had filed in that case, saying, 'It is one of the best briefs submitted to the court in years and in writing the opinion, I quoted liberally from it because it was so admirably reasoned and so clearly stated.' I said, Mr. Chief Justice, you make me very proud. That brief was written by an unknown but very able member of our bar,—altogether the brainiest member of my family. Mrs. La Follette wrote that brief, from start to finish."
"Although Mrs. La Follette never made any further practical use of her law, this training brought her into closer sympathy and companionship with me, in my professional work, and in my political career she has been my wisest and best counselor. That this is no partial judgement, the progressive leaders of Wisconsin who welcomed her to our conferences, would bear witness. Her grasp of the great problems, sociological and economic, is unsurpassed by any of the strong who have been associated with me in my work."

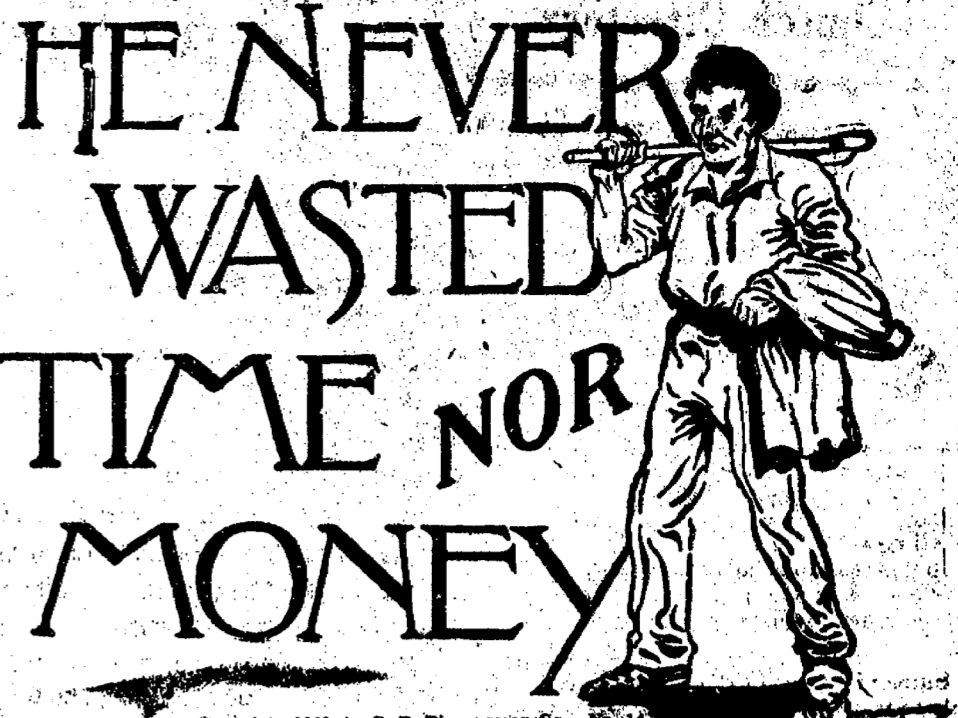
