 The following business was transacted.  
 Ordered: That Chas. J. Edwards be relieved of poll tax he being disabled.  
 Ordered: That Walter R. Harden be relieved of tax on 32 acres of land valued at \$512.00 same having been erroneously listed.  
 Ordered: That Calvin N. Morrow be refunded tax on \$300.00 the same having been erroneously listed.  
 Ordered: That John Shatterly be relieved of tax on 49 acres of land valued at \$250.00 same erroneously listed.  
 Ordered: That the report of J. H. Tarpley Supt. of County Home be received and filed.  
 Ordered: That the report of Dr. Geo. W. Long be received and filed.

 Ordered: That the petition from citizens in Cobles township asking for a public road beginning at some large hickory trees on the new road opened up running from Albert Isleys, Grover Shoffners and others be received and advertised and the Supt. of roads is instructed to investigate the same and report to this Board at its next meeting when the same will be heard.  
 Ordered: That the petition from citizens in Thompson township by T. A. Morrow and others asking for a new road beginning at or near Mr. J. A. Mays mail box on the Saxapahaw road and running West to the Graham and Saxapahaw road South of the bridge over Meador creek near Mr. Thompson's be filed and the Supt. of roads is authorized to investigate the same and report to this Board at its next meeting when the matter will be heard.

Norfolk, Va., June 5.—A sensation was created today at the Chapel-Street school when Joe Tuschman, a fifteen-year-old boy, after being whipped by Miss Goldie Anderson, teacher in the fifth grade, fainted on the street and was carried to St. Vincent's hospital in an unconscious condition. It was several hours before he was revived by the physicians and pronounced out of danger.

The boy's parents immediately filed a complaint against the teacher with the school board asking an investigation. Examining physicians however declare that there was absolutely no indications that the boy had been choked or injured in any way to cause the unconsciousness.
