Washington, Sept. 7. - After a brief conference today between representatives of the thirteen thousand trainmen on the Southern railroads and officials of the lines, further consideration of the demands of the men was deferred until next Wednesday. It was hoped that before the question of a strike was taken up serjously by the men some agreement might be reached and the postponement of further conferences was made to permit of an-

other canvass of the situation. The men demand an increase in wages and other concessions, much of which are declared by the railroad companies to be exorbitant and unreasonable.
