WAKE FOREST VS. UNIVERSITY.

THE STUDENTS OF WAKE FOREST AND HER TOWN FOLKS DEFEAT THE UNIVERSITY BY A SCORE OF 10 TO 7 AFTER ELEVEN INNINGS.

The game of base-ball between Wake Forest and our team at Raleigh on Friday, April 23, was put off until Saturday, the 24th, on account of the inclemency of the weather. The game was a poor one all around, there being about twenty errors made by both teams. There was some heavy batting on both sides. Holding, the Wake Forest pitcher, pitched beautifully, while R. Johnston, our pitcher, having attended the German the night before, was in no fit condition to play the game. Holding is not a student of Wake Forest, but we allowed them to play him for in no other way could a game with Wake Forest be gotten. At the end of the 9th inning the score stood 7 to 7, or it was not until the eleventh inning that the game was decided by Wake Forest's gain of three runs.

1st. Wake Forest—Jones hit his ball to first and out. Mills made a safe hit, stole second and went to third on Howell's two-bagger. Powell never reached first while Mills gained home and Howell third. Sledge went to the bat next and out.

1st. University—Busbee, who batted first, went to first on balls, was forced to second by Graham in the same manner. Oldham followed by base on balls putting each up one base. Jones knocked foul and out. Hamlin struck out. Johnston H. took his base on balls, putting Busbee in. Johnston R. took a well seasoned stick and knocked a clear two-bagger, putting Graham and Oldham home. Shaw struck a foul which was caught by Powell.

2d. Wake Forest—Holding S. got base on balls. Royster hit a fly to Hamlin who muffed it. T. Holding went to his base on balls. Young struck three times without effect and took his seat. Jones struck to H. Johnston and out. Mills hit, forcing Holding to second where the ball was waiting for him.

2d. University—Willard hit a fly to Royster who held it. Busbee thought he would warm up the game and struck a liner to Mills, but got fooled. Graham made a safe hit, stole to second and crossed the home plate on Oldham's hit. Jones put the side out.

3d. Wake Forest—Sledge made a run in this inning by a hit, after Howell and Powell were out, and second on Hamlin's muff of Royster's fly. T. Holding thought to knock a home run but much to his chagrin remained at home on three strikes.

3d. University—University batting was very poor in this inning and they failed to score.

4th. Wake Forest—Young and Jones both failed to assist their side and Mills drove a fly to H. Johnston who muffed it and stole to second. Howell made a safe hit and Mills went to third. Powell made his first on error that put Mills and Howell both on the score book. Graham caught Sledge's fly. The score now stood 4 to 4 and great excitement prevailed.

University came to the bat resolute, but failed to raise their score. Wake Forest tried with the same success. The University went out after their inning with the same score as when they came in.

6th. Wake Forest—Davis who had been substituted for Young fanned out and Jones followed his footsteps. Mills knocked a high over the centre fielder and stole second. Howell hit to left and Mills scored. Powell hit a fly to Graham which was muffed and thrown home just in time to cut Howell off.

6th. University—Willard tried hard to reach first but did not succeed. Busbee hit to center, stole second and advanced to third. Oldham

knocked a fly to Jones in left who caught it and Busbee crossed the plate. Graham was scored on a hit by Jones, and Hendren put the side out.

Wake Forest added nothing to her score in her next inning, although she tried hard.

7th. University—H. Johnston, for some reason, did not do himself justice, but his brother hit to right for a three-bagger, but within a few yards of bird fell and could not gain his base. Shaw gained his first, stole second and third and scored on Busbee's grounder. Graham could not get to first to save his life; so he left Busbee and Willard on base.

Wake Forest then came to the bat, only to go out without scoring, and the University shared the same fate.

9th. Wake Forest—Powell made a two-base hit and Sledge was caught out on a fly to H. Johnston. Powell scored on S. Holding's hit. Royster hit, pulling Holding in. T. Holding and Davis failed to put Royster in.

The University now came in with faces full of resolve, but that was all—resolve—for at the ending of the ninth inning the game stood 7 to 7. In the tenth inning neither side scored.

11th. Wake Forest—Holding S. struck three times and sat down. Royster gained first and went to second on T. Holding's hit. Davis made his first. Jones thought he would show off before the young ladies, and so effectually did he do thus Royster and Holding T. crossed the plate and to add insult to injury he himself tallied before the side was out.

11th. University—Nothing.

THE UNIVERSITY OF VA., DEFEATS OUR BOYS BY A SCORE OF SIX TO ONE.

Our boys and the whole college, in fact, were greatly surprised and delighted at the results of the game played at Richmond. The work of McGuire, as pitcher for the Virginians, without doubt won the game. He struck out 16 of our boys, nine in succession. Only one hit was made by the "tar-heels" and that bunched along in the last inning gave us our much desired run. Our boys played beautiful ball—Busbee had four chances in center field and never refused a single one, catching the last while falling.

After Graham on second had, with Oldham's timely assistance, put out four base runners stealing that base, the Virginians stuck to their first as if glued until a base hit sent them safely to second. Willard played his customary errorless game but batted poorly. Oldham made the finest catch of the game—while under the bat a high foul was knocked towards the grandstand; he threw off his mask and after running a considerable distance caught the ball in his right hand. The spectators at this catch rose and cheered our catcher lustily. The batting on our side was very poor, only two men gaining their first—Ferguson and Busbee in the last inning. Ferguson made our only run and Busbee was put out stealing to second. The Virginians out-weighted us and were giants as compared with our tallest player, Jones.
