Press and Printer has this to say of advertising and it is stated with a great deal of force:

It is continuous effort that pays in advertising as in everything else. A business man doesn't keep his store open one day in the week, or one week in the month, or three months in the year. If he advertises that way that is the impression people get. People are very forgetful. They have to think pretty hard to remember the vice presidential candidate two campaigns back, and yet he was pretty well advertised at the time. 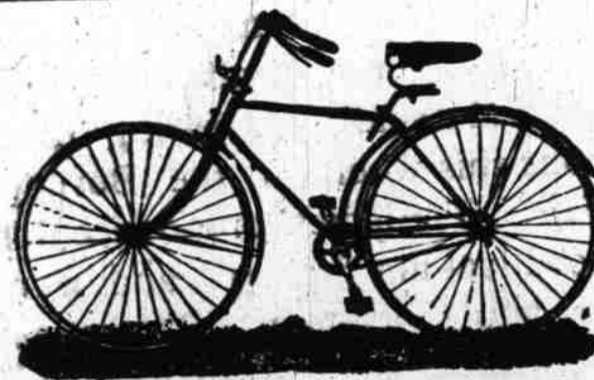
