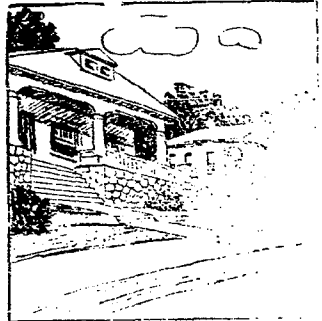

TEDMAN NOMINATED FOR THE THIRD TIME.

Democratic Congressional Convention Gave Major Stedman Practically Unanimous Vote.

Greensboro, June 3.—For the third consecutive time Charles Manly Stedman was nominated for Congress on the Democratic ticket by the Fifth District Judicial Convention, which met here last night. The convention was a cut-and-dried affair, as the opposition was negligible, Major Stedman receiving 535.14 votes out of a total of 402 votes cast. Caswell county gave .04 to Graves and 0.46 to Royster, while Rockingham gave 0.60 to McMichael and 3.76 to Jones.

J. Elmer Long, of Alamance, chairman of the executive committee, called the convention to order, and in the presence of W. H. Phillips, secretary, called for nominations for that position. After some skirmishing, including the refusal of one man to serve, J. S. Beall was elected. The temporary organization was made permanent. The reading of the call was dispensed with and the roll call of all the counties were represented except Person.

The following were elected members of the executive committee for the Fifth District: Alamance, J. Elmer Long; Caswell, R. L. Mitchell; Durham, R. N. Sykes; Forsyth, G. H. Bostwick; Granville, B. K. Lassiter; Guilford, B. C. Hoyle; Orange, Linden Patterson; Person, L. M. Carter; Rockingham, P. W. Glatwell; Surry, S. D. Stokes; J. D. Humphrey, member from Person, was elected by the convention as there was no opposition from that county.

Major Stedman was nominated by A. Wagonmaker, of Greensboro, and the nomination was seconded by H. B. Lassiter, of Granville; P. W. Glatwell, of Rockingham; W. F. Carter, of Surry; and Gilbert T. Stephens, of Person.

"I have known Major Stedman intimately for 11 years. If I were to name his greatest traits of character I should say that they were his constant and unswerving adherence to duty, his absolute fearlessness and fortitude, his eminent truthfulness and his fidelity to his friends. He is sympathetic, generous, charitable, and kind, yet he is an adamant in the pursuance of duty as he understands it. I never knew Major Stedman to harbor malice. He has had occasion to feel aggrieved at uncalculated assaults of the misinformed, the misguided, and sometimes even the vicious, but the thoughts of them quickly passed from his mind. I do not claim that Major Stedman is a perfect man, but in the light of all that I have seen of men in the thirty odd years I have lived, I declare to you that in my judgment he is one of the highest type of men the State of North Carolina has ever produced.

"His spirit has never known defeat. He has never run away from a fight. Generations yet unborn will take courage from the history of a stalwart, courageous soldier of peace as well as war when they read of his career. Twice defeated for the nomination for Governor, he was never dismayed. He never sulked in his tent, but, without malice, without hatred, without bitterness, he arose from the conflict each time a stronger man. Major Stedman has heard it thunder a good man times, but no man ever saw him afraid. Twenty Six Graduates of the North Carolina Medical College at Charlotte Honored.

Charlotte, June 2.—Twenty six young physicians received their diplomas from the North Carolina Medical College in the Auditorium of Queens College last night. The graduating exercises marking the close of what has been the most successful year in the history of the college, were a grandly professional and dignified. The eminent practical address of Dr. W. E. Dreyfus, of Clover, S. C., was one of the features and the reading of the announcements of honors was another. First honor went to Dr. J. H. Caldwell, of Wintboro, S. C., who graduated with a general average of 91.4; second honor to Dr. J. F. Neill, of Charlotte, 94.2; third honor to Dr. R. H. Hardin, of Boone, 94.03; and fourth honor to Dr. C. L. York, of Sparta, 93.1. The hospital appointments were announced as follows: Dr. R. H. Hardin and C. L. Sherrill, the latter of Catawba, to Stetson Hospital, Philadelphia; G. C. Wingate, of Charlotte, to the Rutherford Hospital, Rutherford; J. E. Shafer, of Gold Hill, to Williamsburg Hospital, Brookly; N. Y.; H. W. Corbett, of Mayesville, S. C., and G. G. Snarr, of Lebanon, Va., to the Franklin Square Hospital, Baltimore; and Dr. H. W. Tidmarsh, of Whitmore, S. C., to the James Sprunt Memorial Hospital, Wilmington and the New York Lying In Hospital.
