Charlotte, July 18 .- The fate of H. O. Williams, who has been the defendant in Mecklenburg Criminal Court for two days for the admitted murder of his friend, Dillard Hooker, May 17, was turned over into the hands of the jury last evening at 7 o'clock and after remaining in consultation for a half-hour, a verdict against him for manslaughter was returned. Sentence will not be pronounced until this morning. The trial was finished at 7 o'clock so far as the evidence, the addresses of attorneys and the charge of the court were concerned. It was not the general helief that the jury would occupy much time in arriving at a conclusion, the evidence point ing strongly to second program mischief and finally malice degree murder for which the State were born. He has borne himself with eminent calmvess, manifesting ao superior amount of interest int he proceedings one way of the other. He is a comparatively small man, with thin face, rather emaciated by confinement in prison, and with a sandy mustache. His fea tures have remained uniformly normal during the entire two days.
