CLEANING POLITICS.

"Politics can be cleansed only from the inside of the political party," says Rev. Joseph H. O'Dell, D. D., in the Ladies' Home Journal. "Men who exert any influence in elections must play the game three hundred and sixty five days in the year. A hundred circumstances make it impossible for the minister to be a direct factor in the result, but this does not render him a political nonentity. He can understand enough of the working methods to apply the great determinative principles; he can inspire the sluggish citizens of his congregation to a performance of their civic duties; he can live the most of his church with such a passion for righteousness in public life that they will come on their knees and pray for him to become a candidate for office. He can register his protest against a measure of legislation. What he cannot do is to legislate. He is not a part of their church, but he is a part of their citizenship."

There are certain elements of influence in which a minister is a disinterested because of his pastoral standing, but he is not thereby shut out from a part in the development of modern society. Jesus did not legislate by specific acts, regulations and by-law but by the proclamation of determinative principles. Those principles are as applicable today as they were sixty generations ago. It is the minister's privilege to show the relevance of those principles to modern life; to bring them to bear upon such problems as local option, factory regulations, child labor, workmen's compensation, capital and labor trade competition, penology and a hundred kindred themes. If he can lay the divine compulsions of such principles upon the men who fall within his pastoral domain, he will have become a social civic and political power of the first order without jeopardizing his influence by plunging into a game for which he has had no training and to which he can give adequate time without sacrificing his own unique responsibilities and privileges."

MR. WILSON'S STAND.

President's Position on Tariff is Important—Country Can Only Hope That he Will Recognize the Failure of the Underwood Law and Use His Influence to Remedy it.

As President Wilson wrote to James M. Cox a month ago, the United States possesses in the department of commerce and the federal trade commission agencies empowered to collect all the information the congress needs to write a "scientific" tariff law. The "scientific tariff commission" is an inconsequential incident, which cannot be raised to the dignity of a political issue. The country will not be interested in it and for an excellent reason.

What absorbs the attention of the business community is the President's attitude toward the law now in force. Does he still believe, as he did a year ago, that it should be left unamended until "normal conditions" are restored? Is he still unconvinced that its failure was not thoroughly demonstrated by its operation previous to August 1, 1914? Does he imagine that the establishment of peace in Europe will reinstate the "normal conditions" that obtained until the end of July last year?

The Underwood law was discredited in peace and war has changed the situation of commerce and business. The end of the military struggles will still further alter our circumstances. Already the lessons are written for those with sufficient wit to learn them. The menace of an industrial avalanche of unprecedented intensity is over our manufacturers and business men, and all who are connected with them. Has Mr. Wilson never heard of the danger to the danger of the one hand and the danger of the other hand?

It is a man's duty to schedule his own life. The duties of business men in the communities of the business of the United States can regard with confidence the results industrial change will launch when it stops killing its men; but with the Underwood law in force, this nation will be the mercy of the most skillful and desperate competitors ever known.

REVISE IT UPWARD AND REVISE IT NOW.

The Underwood Tariff was from the start a failure as a revenue producer and by the time the war came it had gone far toward proving itself a failure as a protection against an influx of foreign goods. That influx will, of course, be renewed as soon as the war stops and renewed in still greater volume and in still more perilous form because of the desperate industrial needs of the European countries to recoup their enormous economic losses. We have never known such assaults as will be attempted on us by industrial Europe when it gets thru killing its men; we have never before needed a stout and high Tariff more than we shall need it then. The Underwood Tariff would be no better protection for us than a foot-wide strip of cheesecloth against the waters of a bursted dam.

Clearly, the way to revise the Tariff is upward and the time to revise it is now—Providence (R. I.) Evening Tribune.

PRESIDENT BACKS PLAN TO PROTECT AMERICAN TRADE

Congress to be Asked For Law Against Under Prices by Foreign Firms—Sees Redfield and Davies on Subject—Favorably Receives Suggestions at Conference at White House; Probably Will Deal With This Feature in His Message to Congress; May Amend Tariff Acts.

In considering proposals for legislation to prevent foreign manufacturers flooding the American market with products at the close of the European war, commercial officials have rejected plans calling for tariff law amendment. Dr. E. E. Pratt, chief of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce who has been in charge of the investigation of this subject by the department of commerce said today:

"The question of the tariff has been raised in connection with the building up of new industries. The tariff question can be left out of the discussion. We are not likely to reach any conclusion in such a discussion."

Secretary Redfield made it apparent that he believed the "Anti-Dumping" problem could best be met through changes in the Clayton Anti-Trust Act.

ASKS SLEUTHS TO GET ROBBER OF TRUNK BANK.

Kinston, Oct. 27.—Joe Gant, a Greene county planter who never had much faith in banks, has employed detectives to search for \$2,200 taken by an unidentified thief from a trunk in his home. The money was the savings of a life-time. After talking it the robber carefully looked the trunk as before.
