THE GAME LAWS FOR ALAMANCE. The recent Legislature enacted a law which makes it a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of \$50.00 or by imprisonment for thirty days, for anyone to sell or offer for sale, or to buy or offer to buy, quail within the county of Alamance for a period of two years from March 8th, 1915. The open season for hunting quail is from November 15th to March 1st. The Federal Laws also prohibit the killing of any migratory game or insectivorous birds during the closed season, as prescribed by regulations of the Department of Agriculture under Act of March 4th, 1913. (37 Stat. 847.) They also prohibit: (a) The shipment from the state of any game the export of which is forbidden by local law.

FORMER TRINITY ATHLETE WALKS STREETS WITH DEAD BABY.

One of the most startling chapters in the West Durham vice crusade was written Friday morning when George Spruce, former star catcher of the Trinity college baseball team, but of late proprietor of a suburb pool room, was arrested on three charges. Gambling and running a common gambling house. Running a disorderly house. Allowing minors in pool room. These were the charges lodged against Spruce, by citizens of West Durham.

When the cases were called in recorder's court Friday morning a continuance was granted until next Tuesday morning.

The defendant was placed under \$500 bond.

The witnesses against the West Durham pool room proprietor number seven, six of whom are lads, ranging in ages from 17 to 20.

It is said on good authority evidence was worked up by the vice crusaders of the suburb.

SHOULD A MAN TELL? The Major News, cites and comments on an exceptional but not unparalleled case of a man under sentence of death by a Utah court under conviction for murder. The accused was adjudged guilty on circumstantial evidence, having been found in the vicinage of the house in which the crime was committed shortly after his discovery. He was wounded and bearing on his person evidences of having been engaged in a violent struggle. He himself was the unsupported assertion that he had no knowledge of the murder, but that on the night when it occurred he had been shot in the house of another man in the same neighborhood on account of his improper attentions to the other's wife. However, he refused to give the name of the woman, although knowing that such disclosure would be the means of saving his own life. He preferred to die, he said, rather than bring public disgrace upon her. The case was taken up by friends of the convict and on request of President Wilson execution of the sentence has been suspended pending further investigation.

KITCHEN WILL OPPOSE PLANS OF PRESIDENT.
